SPA, Belgium, July 6 .- The question of execution of the military, naval and aerial clauses of the Versailles treaty was taken up immediately after the formal meeting of the allied premiers with the representatives of Germany, and began at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon noon.

Herr Gessler, explained the German situation in support of the contention of the German Government that it must have an armed force of 200,000 men to maintain order in the republic. He said there was little difference whether the force was lobeled army. He said there was little difference whether the force was labeled army or police, provided the men were under control of the central government. Herr Gessler insisted that the allied plan for 150,000 police, broken up into small bodies, under local control and without co-operation, was insufficient to deal with the present situation in Germany, which, he said, resembled somewhat that existing after the thirty-years' war. 
