

## LONDON PRESBYTERY COMBINES BUSINESS WITH MUCH PLEASURE

Rev. W. L. Knox Succeeds  
Rev. Mr. Robertson As  
Moderator.

### THREE CALLS REVIEWED

Session At Port Stanley Followed by Enjoyable Picnic.

Rev. W. J. Knox of the First Presbyterian Church was appointed moderator of the London Presbytery, succeeding Rev. Mr. Robertson of Moss. At the monthly meeting held at Port Stanley Tuesday morning, the presbytery met in St. John's Church at 10:30 o'clock and adjourned at 12:30 to participate in the annual picnic. The matter of filling the vacancy of the Hamilton road church was brought up and the presbytery unanimously favored the call to the Rev. N. F. Cree of Alliston in the presbytery of Berrie. The stipend offered is \$1,700, four weeks' holidays and free manse. Rev. Mr. Cree has not yet accepted, but is expected to do so and the induction will be held on the 1st of September. Rev. Mr. Malcolm will preach the sermon, Rev. D. L. McCrae will address the minister and Rev. T. A. Symington will address the congregation.

Going To The West.  
A deputation from Glencoe pleaded that the Rev. C. S. Lloyd be not transferred to Rosetown, Sask., from which place he has received a call. Mr. Lloyd, however, tendered his resignation and will leave shortly for the west. This

charge pays a stipend of \$2,000 with a month's vacation and free manse. The congregation at Glencoe was particularly anxious for Mr. Lloyd to retain his charge there, as the church had flourished well during his pastorate. Rev. J. A. Gale tendered his resignation from the charges of Komoka and Blenheim. Rev. Dr. McCrae will act as moderator of the Komoka and Blenheim Park charge during the vacancy. Owing to the great deal of business to be considered by the presbytery an adjourned meeting will be held in the First Presbyterian Church, London, on Tuesday, July 13.

Delightful Picnic.  
Following the business session the clerics with their wives, families and friends went to Inverleith Heights, where dinner was served on long tables placed in such a position that everyone might overlook the lake.

A program of sports was run off afterwards, causing much merriment. In the relay race Rev. Mr. Gale and Miss Stewart captured first prize and Rev. J. Crawford and Mrs. T. A. Symington came in second. The prize for throwing balls was won by Rev. Mr. Child, and of Dorchester and Miss Stewart of Dutton were the winners in the foot-ball race. The prize for the ladies' ball-throwing contest was won by Mrs. T. A. Symington.

The most exciting event of the afternoon was the baseball match. Rev. D. L. McCrae and Rev. John Currie, two of the veteran ministers of the presbytery, were captains of the teams. The score was 7 to 5 in favor of Dr. McCrae's team. This is the third year in succession that Dr. McCrae's team has won the baseball game. Tea was served by the ladies at the early hour in the evening and hearty cheers were given by the members of the presbytery for the most successful picnic yet held.

## NO CLUE AS TO WHEREABOUTS OF GUELPH STREET BOY

Police Institute Search For  
Gerald Mantel, Who Dis-  
appeared On Friday.

Gerald Mantel, the fourteen-year-old and only son of Stephen Mantel of Guelph street, a veteran of the great war, mysteriously disappeared on Friday, July 2, and has not since been located, nor has any clue as to his whereabouts been received by either his parents or the police, who were notified.

This has not been the first time that the boy has been away from home. While Mr. Mantel was away from home during the war the boy ran away a few times, but his longing to see the sights was appeased after an absence of two or three days.

"I thought that he would return by Sunday and that was why I did not notify the police before," said the father. "I believe the boy must have gone to the country. He has no relatives nearer than Longwood, but probably he has not worked at some farm. If he had gone to his relatives they would have heard of him."

Drove With Him.  
According to his father the boy left home in the afternoon with the intention of going to visit him on Piccadilly street where he was moving furniture from a house. Mr. Mantel said that the boy has been in the habit when not attending school to drive around with him. "I did not see him anywhere on that day and after him being missing for so long I became alarmed."

The boy, when he left home, was wearing corduroy trousers, a blue coat and a peak cap. He uttered when he talked and there is a scar on his right cheek.

FALSE ALARM.  
While all London crept away into dry places, the first department answered a false alarm at the corner of Dundas and Wellington streets at 11 o'clock last night. During the hour of rain, owing to the location of the supposed fire, the stations were forced to respond.

## BUILDING PROGRAM WILL NOT RELIEVE ALL OVERCROWDING

Alterations in Seating and  
Other Methods Used To Pro-  
vide Accommodation.

### NURSE RESIGNS

Teachers Over 60 Years Must  
Apply Specially To Hold  
Positions.

That even the school building program now in progress will not entirely relieve the overcrowded conditions was indicated at the regular meeting of the board of education Tuesday afternoon. Records of the board of education, senior school inspector, for providing for some of the expected increase in attendance were adopted. The west room of the Empress Avenue School annex will be resented. At Simcoe Street School the kindergarten room will be fitted with seats and used for grade 1 pupils, while a brick house facing Clarissa street will be used as a kindergarten. A vacant room will be fitted with seats at the Lord Roberts School.

Two temporary rooms will have to be erected at the Wortley Road School, where there has been an increase of 40 pupils, all six years of age.

Reports of inspectors F. P. Gavin and J. C. Miller on the Technical School were received and referred to the technical advisory committee. Mr. Gavin pointed out that there is no gymnasium or auditorium at the Technical School, and suggested that the provision of these should be considered.

Nurse Resigns.  
The resignation of Miss Ada H. Nash from the position of school nurse was accepted. Miss Mary Manley, director of physical training at the collegiate, was granted a year's leave of absence. She pointed out that there are no facilities for this branch of training since the destruction of the collegiate. The resignation of L. D. Lament from the Technical School staff was accepted. Several applications for positions as teachers and school nurses were referred to No. 1 committee.

Notification was received from the department of education that the appointment of V. K. Greer as junior school inspector had been ratified. The regulations of the department require a year to elapse after the appointment before ratification is given.

The board adopted the recommendation of No. 1 committee that no action be taken on the application of the principal of the public schools who held first-class certificates asking for a reconsideration of the salary schedule. The schedule was made on the basis of first-class certificates. Trustee W. B. Wright thought it unfair that first-class men should not get any more than second-class. Trustee Colledge explained that there were comparatively few second-class teachers, and that these all had special qualifications which justified their receiving first-class salaries.

Policies Expire.  
In announcing to the board that the Rectory Street School was struck by lightning last Friday, Trustee Edwin Smith asked authority for No. 2 committee to take up the whole matter of school insurance. This was given. It was understood that most of the policies on school buildings expire in a year's time.

The advisability of allowing a representative of the Secours Nationale to address London public schools was referred to No. 1 committee. Some members of the board pointed out that this had been done in other cities, and that much interest had been shown in the patriotic work being done by this organization. Trustee Colledge, on the other hand, pointed out that even representatives of Canadian patriotic organizations had not been permitted to speak in the schools, and he thought the privilege should not be extended to a foreign one.

No. 3 committee reported that it was dealing with the matter of accommodation for collegiate pupils in the fall term, and that every effort would be made not to inconvenience public school pupils. Mrs. Tanner suggested that the present plan at Lord Roberts school could be continued, except that the public school pupils could come at 9 o'clock instead of 8, and that high school pupils could attend six days a week to make up for the loss of time.

Notice will be sent to all female teachers over 60 years of age and male teachers over 65 that they must make special application to the board if their services are to be retained.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE  
SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE GAS COMPANY.  
I noticed in the report of the gas rate committee at its meeting last night, that the City Gas Company be allowed an increase of \$120,000 a year. The auditors' report as published in the press, is most unsatisfactory. The gas company is asking for an increase in rates on a possible increase in the price of raw material. That is not just to gas consumers. The labor party sent a delegation to the city council asking them to protect the citizens. What protection are the city council going to give the people? NONE! If the City Gas Company had retained the city council to protect their interest, could they do more? It is generally thought that the city council is elected to look after the interests of the people. Are they doing so in this case? What right has the city council to send a delegation to the lieutenant-governor without the consent or will of the people? NONE! It is not the fault of the people of London that the gas company failed to approach last year's council to put an increase of gas rates to a referendum vote. Therefore the gas company should be restrained from acting in an illegal manner by the city council and not supported. The labor party cannot stand by and see the city council act in this manner, but will protest both through the press and to the Government.

## VETS INDORSE NICKLE FOR POLICE CHIEF

All Soldiers' Organizations To  
Support Sergeant of Detectives For Office.

Believing sincerely that Sergeant of Detectives Thomas Nickle to be the best possible man as successor to Chief of Police W. T. Williams, who resigned on Monday, the Central Veterans' Council on Tuesday afternoon, July 5, indorsed his candidature for the position of chief of police. The resolution follows:

Whereas the position of chief of police of the city of London is vacated by W. T. Williams, the council hereby indorse the candidature of Detective Sergeant T. Nickle for the post, believing him to have the necessary qualifications and being conversant with the fact that he will uphold the dignity of the police force.

Furthermore, this council desires to place on record the service of a Nickle in the past, and his patriotism and excellent work during the great struggle for liberty, when he lost those who were near and dear to him.

The Veterans' Council is composed of representatives of the Great War Veterans' Association, the Army and Navy Veterans' Association, and the Grand Army of United Veterans (every soldier's organization in the city).

When the trades and labor council meets in the new labor temple tonight, the resolution will be read. Detectives Thomas H. Nickle's candidature for chief will be made. It was reported last night that according to men prominent in labor circles, it will be passed.

## LOYD GEORGE GIVES GERMANS 24 HOURS TO COME TO TERMS

British Premier Threatens To  
Leave Spa Conference.

SPA, July 6.—(By the Associated Press).—Whether the conference on the peace treaty breaks up tomorrow depends upon whether the Germans present a plan for disarmament, the immediate reduction of the German army from 200,000 to 100,000 men and the surrender of upwards of 1,500,000 rifles in the hands of the people, as well as other demands.

Mr. Lloyd George, speaking for the Allied governments at today's session, presented a ultimatum, he called an ultimatum, but which Dr. Simons, the German foreign minister, termed "a very positive demand."

The German ministers are in session tonight at a villa, three miles from Spa, which is picketed by sentries. Another meeting of the Germans will be held tomorrow morning.

Dr. Simons said to the Associated Press this evening:

"We do not yet know what we will do. The situation is too serious or me to make comment on it. I would rather say that we are not yet ready to present a plan for disarmament. The impression among observers is that the Germans will present a plan. The German delegates do not appear unwilling for their people to see how difficult the position is."

The most dramatic moment of the session was when Premier Lloyd George said: "I do not believe that the Germans intend to execute the treaty."

The German foreign minister immediately interrupted, saying: "You have no right to make any such remark. We are trying to execute the treaty."

SIXTY DETROITERS ARE CHARGED WITH SPEEDING  
WINDSOR, July 6.—With the campaign against speeders and reckless drivers of automobiles in full swing, information has been received that against sixty Detroiters, who will be summoned to appear in Windsor court charged with speeding. The names of the offenders were over on this side of the border attending rates at Devonshire Park yesterday and today.

WINDSOR, July 6.—Three parties of Canadian mounted policemen leave Ottawa shortly for the northern section of Hudson's Bay to carry the law of the white man into the home of the Eskimo. The three parties leave via steamer at Montreal for their long journey into northern waters. One party will act as a court and is in charge of Inspector Thomas, with Sergeant Douglas as assistant. Another party consisting of Inspector Phillips and Sergeant Joy will journey on the same steamer to God's Island, a remote place on the south side of Hudson's Bay, where there is an isolated Eskimo settlement. The third party is for the purpose of a branch of the department of customs at Port Burwell, on the Quebec shore of Hudson's Bay Straits. This will be in charge of Sergeant Wright and one trooper. They will be stationed at this extremely northern post to collect all necessary customs duties from United States and foreign ships which arrive on the coast and wish to trade with the natives.
