However, Charles met his rival at the Union Station and, after a few minutes' conversation, the western lacrosse crack fell in line for a Tecumseh berth this season.

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REVISED BASEBALL CODE CHANGES IN THE RULES

Official Interpretation as Promulgated by the Major League Committee.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—The joint rules committee of the major baseball leagues, composed of C. W. Somers (chairman), Charles A. Comiskey, B. F. Shibe, T. J. Lynch, Clark Griffith and John A. Heyd (secretary), have promulgated the following changes in the playing code.

To Rule 23 a new section has been added, which reads as follows:

Section 4.—Whenever one player is substituted for another, whether as batsman, baserunner or fielder, the captain of the side making the change shall be entitled to all the bases then occupied by the player substituted.

Section 5.—The umpire shall assess a fine of \$5 against each offending player in the following cases: (1) If the player intentionally discolor or damage the ball. (2) If the player fails to be seated on the bench when ordered to do so by the umpire. (3) If the player violates the coaching rules and refuses to be seated on the bench when ordered to do so by the umpire. (4) If the captain fails to notify him when one player is substituted for another.

Section 6.—In cases where substitute players show their disapproval of decisions by yelling from the bench, the umpire shall make special ground rules to cover such cases. If the player continues he shall fine each offender \$10, and if the disturbance is persisted in the umpire shall eject the offender from the game.

Section 7.—The umpire shall have the right to eject any player who is guilty of misconduct on the field. If the umpire declares the batsman or another baserunner out for interference with the play, the runner shall be out.
