Prof. Day's letter in yesterday's World quotes figures to show us whether hog feeding at present prices of grain pays. It looks correct backed up as it is by experimental knowledge.

Profit in Hog-Feeding

Altho the Profits are Small, Good Prices for Grains and Roots are Received—More Careful Attention Needed.

The present prices for pork do not look very encouraging to the average farmer. Probably the majority will say that there is no money in pork at these prices.

For the benefit of some who may not have read yesterday's article by Prof. Day, we reprint a part thereof.

During the past two years, the Ontario Agricultural College has collected some very valuable data regarding the cost of raising hogs.

Mill feeds are somewhat higher this year than they were last year. Nevertheless, mixtures of corn, barley and oats can be obtained that will not cost the farmer an outrageous price.

1 bushel corn, 60 lbs. .... 65 cents  
1 bushel oats, 34 lbs. .... 50 cents  
1 bushel peas, 34 lbs. .... 50 cents

In other words we have 100 lbs. corn with 100 lbs. oats and 100 lbs. peas for \$13.35 per cwt. after paying for the grinding at five cents per cwt.

But take out the oats and put in a low grade of wheat and you get plenty of mangel, this money would make a good feed for feeders. The cost then comes at \$12.35 per cwt. Leave out the peas at 50 cents per bushel and the cost stands at \$11.85 per cwt.

In other words the farmer who studies his buying and will find that he can land good feed into his bins for less than \$12.00 per cwt. Prof. Day has experiments to show that such feed would warrant him taking as low as five cents a pound for his pork, and then also return him 20 cents per cwt. for skim milk and 10 cents a bushel for roots.

No Excuse for poor prices. This is not intended to be an apology for low prices. There is in the World's estimation no excuse to be offered by the packers for the low prices at present obtainable.

At 4 1/2 cents per cwt. for skim milk, 20 cents per cwt. for skim milk and 10 cents per bushel for roots.

At 6 cents per bushel for roots, they would return \$23.37 per cwt. of meat, 20 cents per cwt. for skim milk, and 10 cents per bushel for roots.

LIVE TOPICS DISCUSSED


Meetings for Several Districts Already Announced—Feeding a Leading Issue.

Scotland has had a very peculiar harvest this year. It seems rather unnecessary to break the Sabbath Day by such work, but the fact of their oats being in stock in November drives some to desperate measures.

An idea of the increasing scarcity of white pine timber is given by the New York quotations, on a basis of carload lots, says The Breeder's Gazette. "Up to the best grade cost \$97 to \$114 a thousand board feet and the select or next lower grade cost \$75.50 to \$89.50. Men who are not yet middle-aged remember the time when these grades could be purchased at \$15 to \$25 a thousand feet. The present quotations on quarter sawed pine, which are \$75 to \$80, offer another basis of comparison which indicates the condition of the market for white pine. The best stands of this timber now in the United States are in scattered sections in Minnesota, New England, and parts of Idaho.
