### NATIONAL LACROSSE UNION OF FOUR CLUBS

#### Tecumsehs Allowed to Withdraw and New Schedule Adopted.

Montreal, July 8.—Shamrocks, Nationals, Cornwall and Ottawa will henceforth constitute the National Lacrosse Union of four clubs. A meeting of the M. A. A. A. With the Tecumseh club unable to continue, the executive decided to allow the Toronto club to withdraw and voted to commence the season anew.
