

BUTT HALE PACES SENSATIONAL HEAT

But Loses to Russell Boy, Two
Out of Three, in Special
Race on Closing Day.

Barford, Conn., Sept. 7.—Butt Hale, the brown gelding in Tommy Murphy's stable, was the sensation of the final day's meeting of the Grand Circuit at Charter Oak Park today, despite the fact that he lost the special pacing race with Russell Boy in two heats out of three. The speedy youngster sired by Senator Hale surprised the talent by capturing the second heat from Russell Boy and in doing so lowering his race record to 2:15 1/2.

The other three races on the day's program were over the half-mile track, and were comparatively tame performances. Minnie Arthur won the 2:15 trot, and the 2:15 pace was won by Birdie.

RIBOT MINISTRY QUILTS

THRU CABINET CRISIS

Premier Will Form New Government Next Week.

Paris, Sept. 7.—The resignation of the Ribot ministry was decided upon unanimously after a cabinet meeting this morning.

President Poincare has asked the premier and his ministers to withhold their resignations until the president has called the cabinet.

The cabinet has been summoned to Paris by telegram.

The Matin, discussing the ministerial situation, says that Premier Ribot's absence at the Marine celebrations interrupted his poor parlors, but that it is certain that the premier handed the cabinet's resignation to the president.

President Poincare at this morning's cabinet meeting. The president, continues the newspaper, after the customary consultations with the presidents of the senate and the chamber of deputies, is certain to ask M. Ribot to form a new ministry, which is not likely to be completed before next week.

WEEKLY SPORT LETTER

The "shin ball" probably will be barred from the world series trials. And thereby hangs a tale of sadness for the White Sox rooters, who figure that their favorites will win the American League banner.

Danforth and Cloette are the mainstays of the White Sox hurling division. Should the Chicagoans carry the Johnsonian standard into the big October show, it is certain that these two pitchers will be called upon to perform the bulk of the defensive work. And minus the "shin ball," which has been their main stock-in-trade through the season, they do not look up quite as formidably as they have earlier in the year.

Just the other day Ben Johnson abolished the "shin ball." There is no rule in the National League which prohibits the use of this pitching trick, but always in a world series conflict the rules that govern one league usually hold good for the other. Should the National League request that the "shin ball" be pronounced from the blue ribbon event, it is certain that the request will be granted.

And it is more likely that the giant owners will engineer such a request. So, the White Sox should brace through the winter, it will mean that one of the pitching tricks used to lift it to the crest of the American League will not be permissible in the effort to gain the highest honors in the baseball world.

The Story of Boland.

Hughie Jennings probably experiences a few palpitations in the pulsating region whenever he recalls how close he came to losing Bernie Boland, one of the best young pitchers that has come into the majors in many years.

Back in August, 1914, the Tigers secured Boland from the Nashville Club of the Southern League, upon recommendation of its scouts. The price agreed upon was \$2,000. But it was a conditional purchase. The agreement had a clause in it which forced the Tigers to pay Nashville a small sum down and the balance as soon as the 1915 season opened, unless Boland divined in which case the Tigers were to return him.

In the training camp days of 1915, Boland didn't exhibit anything that evoked rapturous exclamations from Jennings. In fact, his work was only so-so. Jennings felt that he might make good as a big leaver, but was in doubt as to whether the 23-year-old kid was "ripe."

A few days after the season opened the Nashville Club communicated with Jennings in this way:
