### WHEAT ADVANCED BY SNOW AND RAIN

Chicago Stiffens Prices Owing to Adverse Seeding Weather.

### TRADERS RUSH TO BUY

Temporary Break Speedily Overcome by Forthcoming of Good Support.

CHICAGO, April 29.—Higher prices in the wheat market resulted today from show and rain in the northwest, where already the spring crop acreage had been diminished to a notable extent by previous adverse conditions. Prices closed unsettled, but with gains of %c to 11-8c at \$1.13 7-8 for May and \$1.15% for July. Other leading staples, too, all showed an advance—corn 3-8c to %c, oats %c to 3-8c, and provisions 10c to 20c.


