SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least \$0 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—six\_months' residence in each of three years, after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres' extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres, and erect a house worth \$300.

## CHERRIES LACK QUALITY

Raspberries Sold From Eighteen to Twenty-Two Cents on Wholesale Market.

BEANS ARE SCARCE

Green Peas Coming in Heavily-Carrots and Beets Also Plentiful.

Strawberries were only shipped in nall quantities yesterday, causing the firm, the price ranging from 8c to 12c: only a very small quantity go-ing at the 8c and 12c; the bulk selling

There were several crates of rasp perries shipped in, selling at 18c to 22c per box.

Cherries—The bulk of this fruit still shows waste and rapidly becomes worse, causing prices to vary materially, the black cherries selling at 65c to 90c and \$1 per 6 quarts and 75c to \$1.75 per 11-quart; the sour ones at 25c to 40c per 6-quart, and 50c to 75c per 11-quart; while the white eating variety go at 40c to 60c per 6-quart.

Gooseberries still drag, the boxes selling at 5c to 8c. while 11-quart baskets sell at 35c to 50c.

The California fruits continue to come in freely, plums selling at \$1.75 to \$2.25 per case; peaches at \$1.50 to \$1.75; pears at \$3.50 to \$3.75, and grapes at \$4 per case; centalcupes keeping high at \$6.50 per case, standards.

Georgia penches are increasing in quantity, and are of good quality, selling at \$3.25 per six-basket carrier.

Beans were rather scarce yesterday and brought slightly higher prices, selling at 65c to 85c per 11-quart basket, and \$2 per bushel.

Green peas came in heavily and declined in price; a lot of them having too many old ones mixed in with the others; they sold at 25c to 50c per 11-quart basket.

Carrots and beets also came in more freely, selling at 30c to 35c per dozen
