BOOSTING LACROSSE ACROSS THE LINE.
New York, Jan. 12.—At a meeting of the U. S. Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association, here Saturday, Syracuse was admitted, and Rutgers announced their intention of playing. West Point will probably be induced to enter a team, and special efforts are being made to have the game adopted in the high schools of New York, Boston and Baltimore. Penn. FRENCH RUNNER MAKES NEW DISTANCE RECORD.
Paris, Jan. 12.—A French distance runner named Guillemot ran eight miles in the fast time of 33 minutes, 29 and 4-5 seconds, which is a record for France. The course was laid out from Versailles to Commenay in the Bois de Boulogne, and Guillemot ran the distance in better time than the railway train average between Paris and Versailles.

THE eight mile world's running record is held by Alfred Shrubbs, who made it in England in November, 1904. Shrubbs' time was 40 minutes, 5 seconds. This time was made in a ten-mile run by Shrubbs, who lowered all records from six miles to ten miles, finishing the run in 50 minutes, 40 and 2-5 seconds.

THEY FIGHT IN LONDON OR PARIS

Manager Kearns Says Little Chance for Dempsey and Carpenter in States.

Los Angeles, Jan. 12.—J. W. Coffroth, who holds the floor with his \$400,000 bid for Tijuana, which has been accepted by the Dempsey crowd, is at a loss to explain just what Dempsey means in stating that the fight will be held in New Jersey. Coffroth said: "Things may come around so that Dempsey will have the first call if he promotes the bout. The date is a matter of agreement, and either July 4 or Sept. 6 is immaterial to me."

Dempsey said: "This New Jersey affair is new to me, but maybe it won't be to Kearns."

Manager Jack Kearns declares that this New Jersey idea is "all news" to him. He is at a loss to explain Dempsey's statement, and is strong for postponing the fight.

Kearns further said: "In the first place, Tijuana is beyond the extreme northern boundary of the United States. It is fifteen miles from San Diego, and transportation facilities are lacking. The result was that he was not able to get the fight to Tijuana. His chief aim is to be the promoter, whether in Mexico, the United States, England or France, he doesn't seem to care."

As far as I can see now, there doesn't appear to be much chance of holding the fight in the United States at all. Kearns is the present outlook. London or Paris will land it. In the meantime, neither Dempsey nor myself is worrying."
