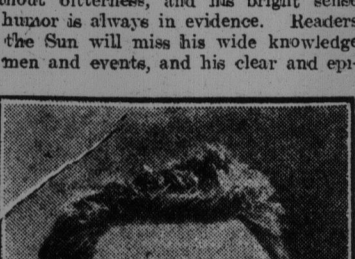

CANADIAN BRIEFS

Customs receipts of Canada show an increase of \$318,197 for February, and \$2,401,344 for eight months, compared with last year. Fire ignited Karn Hall, Montreal, today; loss \$50,000. St. James' Christian is reported at Halifax, and the brig Marconi off Liverpool, N. S., today. The Cornishian leaves for St. John tonight. On the voyage James Green, of Glasgow, one of the crew, was washed overboard. The Montreal stock market was strong and active today. Post Arthur wants government aid for a dry dock, breaker and post-office. B. Rogers and Mr. Warburton of Charlottetown are in Ottawa. The steamer Bruce will be fitted with Marconi wireless attachment, and a station probably erected at Sydney. The steamer Baton from Jamaica visited St. George (Barwell), the detaching Toronto bank seller on board, reached Halifax at noon. Detectives will take Hanwell to Toronto this afternoon. Serious charges have been made against Hon. Frank Oliver and Hon. Walter Scott in connection with the elections in Alberta.

BIG STORM COMING

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The local weather bureau has received the following special from Washington: "Northwest storm warning 10:15 a. m. from Jackson, N.Y. to New York, severe storm over North Carolina moving east northeast, increasing winds becoming high northwest this afternoon with snow on the New Jersey and Delaware coasts."

EQUITY COURT

In the equity court before Judge Barker yesterday the case of A. E. Barnhill vs. the Hampton and St. Martin's Railway was argued. It was a foreclosure suit for principal and interest on \$814,000. C. N. Skinner for plaintiff and H. A. McKeown for defendant. An order was made that the bill be taken pro confesso, amount to Nov. 1, last being \$814,000, the property to be sold under direction of a referee and out of the proceeds, the plaintiff's costs to be first paid including costs of sale. Balance to be paid to plaintiff to be distributed by him in execution of the trust of mortgage. The plaintiff to have the liberty to bid as a trustee solely and may holder of bonds to have liberty to bid.

In the matter of the Colwell infants, an application of E. T. C. Knowles, plaintiff, to sell real estate was refused.
