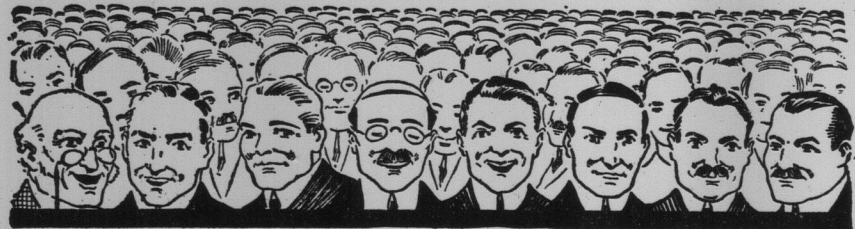

## GERMANS ACKNOWLEDGED GOOD TREATMENT GIVEN PRISONERS BY BRITISH

The Hague, Sept. 15.—(Correspondence)—At a recent conference held here British and German delegates to discuss the question of treatment and exchange of prisoners, the Germans entered the conference room from a door on the side of the room and the English on a door on the opposite side. The delegates were always already seated at the table in the midst of the conference. No conversation took place except upon the business of the conference. Before the conference ended, the chief

of the German delegation rose and insisted upon thanking the British warmly for the way in which their prisoners had been treated. He said no other country had behaved so well. The English commissioners bowed their thanks, but did not return the compliment.

## WAR MENUS

How to Save Wheat, Beef and Bacon  
for the men at the front. Issued  
from the Office of the Food  
Controller for Canada.

### MENU FOR THURSDAY.

**Breakfast.**  
Oatmeal Porridge. Milk. Sugar.  
Fried Potatoes with Mince Ham  
Brown Bread. Butter. Tea or Coffee

**Luncheon.**  
Potato Soup. Crackers. Tea  
Baked Apples. Cake.

**Dinner.**  
Baked Salt Codfish. Mashed Potatoes  
Baked Squash. Squash Pie.  
The recipes for Potato Soup and  
Baked Salt Cod, mentioned above, are  
as follows:

Potato Soup:—  
One quart milk.  
One and a half cups mashed potato.  
One tablespoon butter.  
Salt, pepper and grated onion to taste.  
Cook the potatoes, mash and put  
through a sieve. Put on the milk over  
the fire with onion. Bring to a boil,  
add the mashed potato, season and add  
the tablespoon of butter. Serve hot.

Baked Salt Cod—  
Wipe the fish and place on a buttered  
baking tin. Prepare a dressing of bread  
crumbs, savory herbs, parsley, pepper  
and salt. Bind it with a little beaten  
egg. Place this on the fish and season.  
Add to the top a little fat. Bake in a  
moderate oven for ten minutes for every  
pound and five minutes extra. Serve  
with Hollandaise Sauce with the addi-  
tion of some Anchovy, or any sauce that  
may be preferred.

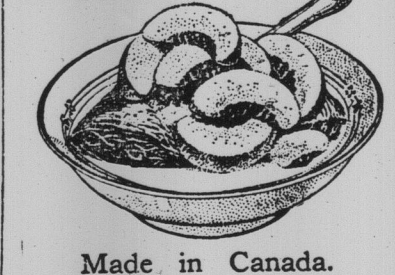

## TO RAISE A MILLION FOR JEWISH FIGHTERS

New York, Oct. 10.—Colonel Harry  
Cutler, chairman of the Jewish Board  
for Welfare Work in the United States  
army and navy, announces an active  
campaign for a fund of \$1,000,000 in be-  
half of the board, with which to pro-  
secute welfare work among the Jewish  
soldiers at the various cantonments of  
the national army and at the front in  
France, as well as in behalf of the Jew-  
ish sailors in the navy.

There are more than 50,000 Jewish  
soldiers in the national army and en-  
listed in the regular army, a percentage  
far in excess of the ratio of population  
of the Jews. The American Jewish  
Soldiers' Bureau, of which Dr. William  
J. Sirotitch, of New York, has been  
temporary chairman, has agreed to turn  
over to the Jewish board for Welfare  
Work its entire lists of membership,  
card catalogues and data of every sort.  
This organization will soon go out of  
existence, giving the entire support to  
the organization of which Colonel Cutler  
is the head.

## KERENSKY'S DISEASE MAKES BETTER PROGRESS THAN REVOLUTIONARY CAUSE

Geneva, Oct. 10.—Premier Kerensky  
has written a sad letter to a former uni-  
versity comrade here. He says calmly  
that his disease—tuberculosis—is mak-  
ing better progress than the Russian re-  
volutionary cause, and that he is burn-  
ing the candle at both ends in order to  
save his country, and hopes not to die  
before Russia is liberated from the Ger-  
man yoke, and the present anarchy de-  
velops into a real Russian democracy.

If in a single season the people of  
the United States can produce in "war  
gardens" \$35,000,000 worth of food—  
the amount estimated by Charles La-  
throp Pack, president of the National  
Emergency Food Garden Commission—  
there is reason to hope that while the  
war lasts the farmers of the country  
will bring their output to a level above  
anything heretofore known.
