ITALIANS GAIN FROM TWO TO SIX MILES

Fighting With Austrians Has Grown More Violent—Russian Submarines Engaged Ten German Warships and Did Damage

Rome, June 9.—Gains of from two to six miles are reported for the Italian army which are at grips with the Austrians over a front stretching from Gassano to the Gulf of Trieste. The fighting has grown more violent around Tolmino on Isontro River, where the Austrians are strongly entrenched.

ATTACKED GERMAN WARSHIPS
Petograd, June 9.—The Army Messenger referring to the naval engagement June 5 off the Gulf of Riga, says that Russian submarines engaged no fewer than ten German warships, attempting a sortie into the Baltic.

BRYAN BACK TO PRIVATE LIFE

German Note Likely Made Public on Thursday
HE COULD NOT AGREE
United States Has Definitely Concluded That The Lusitania Was Unarmed Merchantman—Americans Should Have Been Disembarked Before Ship Destroyed

Washington, D. C., June 9.—After two years and three months as secretary of state of the United States, a little more than half of the Wilson administration, William Jennings Bryan sought to return to private life. He left the cabinet because he could not join in the approval of the note to Germany or reconcile his principles to the course which he declared to be nearest his heart, "the prevention of war." This develops a grave turn in the foreign policy.

STRONG OFFENSIVE BY ALLIES AT DARDANELLES
Fleet and Land Force Attacking The Turks Vigorously
Paris, June 9.—The allies have resumed the offensive at several points on the Gallipoli peninsula since Friday, says a dispatch from Mytilene. The attack was begun in the morning by a general bombardment of the enemy's positions from the sea. The allies were supported by the land troops near Seddul Bahr, while the rest of the fleet castles bombard the coast. HAS COLLECTED MORE THAN \$12,000 ALREADY ANSWERS TO HIS APPEAL
