nominated as Liberal candidate in York-Sunbury to oppose R. B. Hanson, Conservative, who represented the con-stituency in the last parliament. This completed the list of

nominations, all other candi-

dates in this province having previously been in the field. The determination to place a candidate in the field, it is said, was reached by the local Liberals over the week-end. Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, insisted that a candidate be placed in the field in order that all constituencies be rounded out with candidates. C.R. Hawkins was witness to the signatures on the papers of Mr. Hughes, and E. Allison MacKay is his agent. The witness to the signatures on Mr. Hanson's papers was John M. Wiley. C. L. Dough-

erty is his agent. The Liberal candidate is a distinguished member of the New Brunswick bar, and a member of the firm of McLellan and Hughes. He was Liberal candidate on a provincial ticket some years ago.


