WEEK-END TRAIN  
FROM NEW YORK  
FOR TOURISTSJoint Conference Takes Further  
Steps to Promote  
Traffic to Maritimes

MEETING HELD HERE

Heavy Passenger Business is  
Expected During the  
Coming Summer

A SPECIAL week-end train will be run from New York and Boston to Saint John during the coming tourist season, it was announced at a conference between representatives of several railway systems and delegates from the various tourist associations of the Maritime Provinces held in the Admiral Beatty Hotel yesterday afternoon. The new train will be known as "The Acadian." It will leave New York on Fridays at 9 a. m., arriving at Boston at 4 p. m., and at Saint John shortly after 6 a. m. the following morning. The early hour of arrival will allow connections to be made for all points in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. The new service is somewhat in the nature of an experiment and if it is well patronized it is probable that additional trains will be added.

**PURPOSE OF CONFERENCE.**  
The purpose of the conference was to promote tourist traffic in the Maritime Provinces, the tourist associations and railway lines working toward this end. It was announced that the Maritime Provinces would be featured as a playground in the business which heavy passenger co-operation in this respect was promised by the railwaymen and the tourist representatives. Optimistic opinions were expressed as to the prospects for next summer and it was announced that indications would be the largest on record due to co-operative work already done between the various boards and the railways.

Halliwell, Bangor, general manager of the Bangor and Aroostook railway; G. M. Houghton, of Bangor, general passenger agent of the Bangor and Aroostook railway; J. M. Woodman, Saint John, divisional superintendent of the C. P. R.; H. C. Brown, Charlottetown, vice-president of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association; Ray Tenney, of Charlottetown, secretary of the association; Colonel Innes, of Halifax, representing the Nova Scotia government; C. C. Avar, Sackville, vice-president of the New Brunswick Tourist Association; C. B. Allan, of Saint John, secretary of the association.

Most of the delegates left last evening after the conclusion of the business. Mr. Melanson will go to Montreal for a few days before returning to Montreal. Representatives from the Maine Central, the Boston and Maine, and New York, New Haven and Hartford railways were not present on account of the storm.

Cunards Add Ships  
To Canadian Route

LONDON, Feb. 11.—Further development in the Cunard steamship service to Canada is announced. Early in the spring the Cunard Company will put two additional ships in the service, joining the ships plying between Liverpool and Canada and calling at Belfast. This will provide practically a weekly service. The additional steamers are being put on the Canadian route in order to cope with the heavy tourist traffic anticipated, and to take care of the increased migration which is expected as a result of the recent emigration agreement between the British and Canadian governments whereby migrants may reach the Dominion at a cost of only \$2.

PAY TRIBUTE TO  
LATE MINISTER

Large Number at Service in  
Memory of Rev. Dr.  
Hutchinson

Clergymen of Several City  
Churches Speak in Praise of  
Former Pastor

About 400 citizens gathered in the Main street Baptist church last night to do honor to the late pastor, Rev. Dr. David Hutchinson, in an impressive memorial service. Dr. Hutchinson had been pastor of the church for twenty years and had died suddenly in Brockville, Ont., his new pastorate a few days previously. W. J. McAulay, chairman of the Board of Deacons of the church, presided at the service and among the ministers who spoke were: Rev. Dr. S. S. Poole, president of the Maritime Baptist convention; Rev. Dr. J. A. Morrison, minister of St. Matthew's Presbyterian church; Rev. G. B. MacDonald, pastor of the Victoria street church; Rev. Henry Mahon, Douglas avenue Christian church; Rev. A. I. Tedford, of Tabernacle church; Rev. C. T. Clark, Fairville Baptist church; Rev. E. R. MacWilliam, Waterloo street Baptist church; Rev. A. K. Herman, acting pastor of Main street church, and Rev. H. A. Goodwin, pastor of the Portland United church. The full choir of the Main street church rendered special music.

**MUSICAL ANTHEM.**  
The music included an anthem, "When Are There," a mixed quartet, "Rock of Ages," by the Misses Parlee and Girvan and Messrs. Stillwell and Wry; a solo "Angels Ever Bright and Fair" by Miss Parlee, and the hymns "Peace, Perfect Peace," "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and "Still, Still With Thee." The invocation was delivered by Mr. MacMillan. Mr. Clark read the service. The prayer was offered by Mr. Tedford and Mr. Clark pronounced the benediction. Mr. Herman spoke of the death of Dr. Hutchinson as a challenge to those he had ministered to for so long to strive to emulate his example. Mr. MacDonald recalled Dr. Hutchinson as the friend and beloved brother of 10 years' acquaintance, who had lent dignity to his occasion; one whose personality, strength and sweetness were so blended that he had not only been a comfort to his own congregation, but had left a deep impression upon other denominations and the country as a whole.

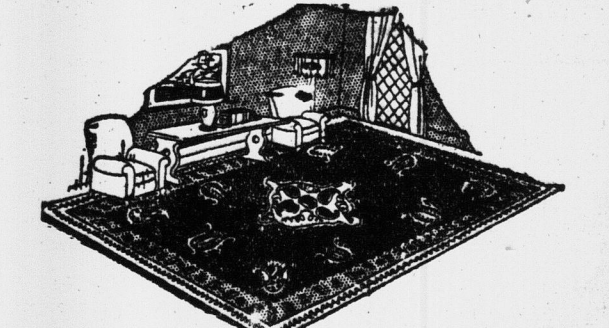
**MR. GOODWIN HEARD.**  
Mr. Goodwin spoke of Dr. Hutchinson as a man always ready to take his part in any work for the betterment of the community and one whose duty would be mourned by all. Dr. Morrison paid a glowing tribute to Dr. Hutchinson, who, he said, had been one of his closest friends. Dr. Hutchinson and Dr. J. K. Campbell of London, he said, were the only two clergymen he would have liked to have for his own minister and his preference for these two was founded on their transparent sincerity. It took the courage of Apostle days to be sincere in the present day, he declared.

**DR. POOLE SPEAKS.**  
Dr. Poole said that it seemed only a few days since he had attended a gathering to say good-bye to Dr. Hutchinson and now his friends had come to pay honor to his memory. Dr. Poole considered large heartedness and devotion to duty had been the predominant traits of Dr. Hutchinson's character. He had never shirked a duty nor could he bear to be idle for a moment. Dr. Hutchinson had passed on, said Dr. Poole, but his work would live. Mr. Mahon spoke briefly, saying that while he could claim no long association with Dr. Hutchinson, he had most grateful memories of him as the first person to welcome him when he had come to Saint John to be the pastor of the Douglas avenue Christian church.

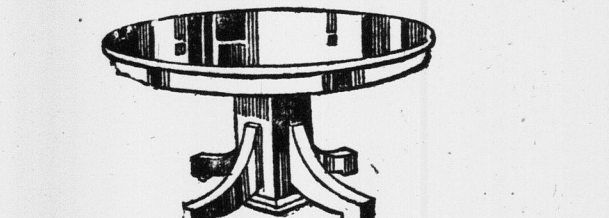

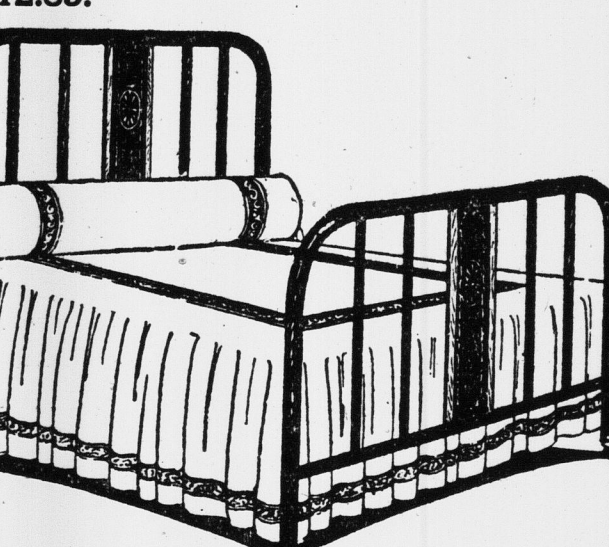

New Era In Air Traffic Opens  
Monday, As Ford Line Starts

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(United Press)—A new era in commercial aviation opens Monday when Henry Ford, Detroit automobile manufacturer, begins operating two commercial air mail lines, one between Detroit and Chicago, the other between Detroit and Cleveland.

Both routes will connect with the government operated transcontinental line and will speed up mail between the three cities and Detroit and surrounding territory to the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. The first plane will hop off from Chicago for Detroit on February 15, at 8 a. m., and make the trip with a cargo of United States mail in about three hours. The return trip will start from Detroit at 8:15 p. m. On the other line the mail plane will leave Detroit at 10:40 a. m., and start back from Cleveland for the home range at 2:30 p. m. Ford will operate the lines for six and three-fourths cents an ounce of mail carried. The government charges 10 cents. But in addition to mail the ships can carry freight and passen-
