

Noted Speakers To Be Heard At National Convention Of The Catholic Women's League

Sessions Open This Week at Ottawa and Program Carries Many Interesting Features—Chateau Laurier is the Headquarters—Four Delegates From Saint John

THE PROGRAM for the national convention of the Catholic Women's League, which convenes this week and next week in Ottawa, and is being attended by several delegates from Saint John, has many interesting features.

Mrs. B. C. McCann, national president, will be in the chair, and the convention, which will be in session in the Chateau Laurier, opens on Friday. The Ottawa sub-divisions will entertain the executive at luncheon that day and the Catholic Girls' Club will be hostesses for tea.

At the formal opening in the evening Most Rev. H. J. O'Leary, D.D., Archbishop of Edmonton, and honorary chaplain of the League, will offer the opening prayer and greetings and address of welcome will be given by Mrs. W. J. Quinn, president of the Ottawa sub-division; Most Reverend J. M. Enard, D.D., Archbishop of Ottawa; Mayor Baillarge, His Excellency the Apostolic delegate in Canada and Newfoundland, and Rt. Hon. F. A. Anglin, P.C., K.C., St. G. Chief Justice of Canada. Mrs. McCann will give her annual address as national president.

On Saturday morning reports to be presented will be as follows: Honorary secretary, Mrs. W. J. Lyons, Ottawa; honorary treasurer, Miss M. L. Quinlan, Niagara Falls, and executive secretary, Miss Margaret Jones, Montreal. At the luncheon that day when the Ottawa city sub-division members will be hostesses, Rev. George Daly, C.S.B., formerly of Saint John, will speak on "Sisters of Service and Western Problems." The national committees which will report in the afternoon are those on organization, laws, finance, magazine, education, social welfare, child welfare, immigration, Travelers' Aid, Sisters of Service and Girl Guides.

The delegates will enjoy a drive to the Experimental Farm and be entertained at tea by Mrs. F. A. Anglin. In the evening the address will be given by Rt. Rev. Felix Courtyer, O.P., O.B., Bishop of Alexandria, who will speak on "Catholic Women's Place in the Women's World."

CONVENTION SERMON

On Sunday morning Rev. E. J. Cornwell will be celebrant at high mass in St. Joseph's church and the convention sermon will be preached. At a mass meeting in St. Patrick's Hall, in the afternoon Rev. James M. Gillis, C.S.P., editor of "Catholic World," will give an address on "Culture and Catholicism." Later that afternoon there will be Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. Very Rev. Canon Fitzgerald, officiating, and the solemn act of consecration to the Blessed Virgin will be made.

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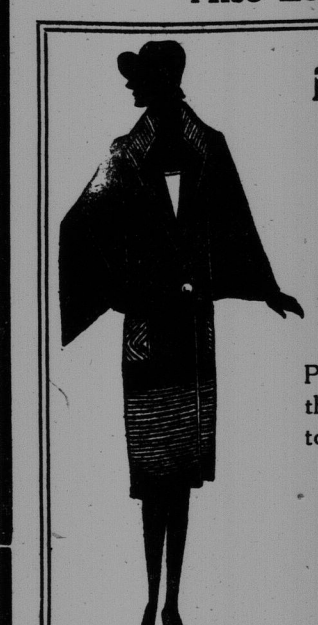

GOVERNMENT ACTS ON U.S. BERRY GLUT

Canadian Custom Officers instructed to Regulate Flood of Small Fruit

OTTAWA, June 10.—The government has taken action with respect to the report that the Canadian market was made in the House of Commons by Hon. G. H. Boulton, Minister of Customs and Excise, in reply to a question by Hon. S. F. Tolmie (Conservative, Victoria).

Mr. Boulton stated that a representative of the Dominion had been sent to the country of production to ascertain on the ground the home market value of the fruit in question. In the meantime customs officers had been instructed to accept shipments subject only to any additions or corrections which might be made under the dumping clause.
