#### OUR JOLLY JOKER.

Hon. Dr. Baxter can always be counted on to give his Conservative friends something new to cheer. A few months ago they were lustily cheering his declaration never again to have anything to do with a Conservative party that did not deal with the Portland C. N. R. competition to his satisfaction. That sounded inspiring. Even the Globe was led to acclaim it as a worth while promise. But Dr. Baxter himself withdrew it when he abandoned federal for provincial politics. Then along came Hon. Arthur Meighen and plainly told the party in this city to stop talking about Portland because he intended to maintain that competition whether we like it or not. Since that Portland and the C. N. R. have not been mentioned by the Conservatives. It is just as well for no promise can get away from the fact that Mr. Meighen made Portland a C. N. R. port without safeguarding Maritime interests. He wrote into his legislation nothing that would prevent the competition established by that purchase, although General McLean and Hon. George W. Fowler, then members of parliament, warned him what would happen and voted against his proposal. Forced to find something to inspire the drooping spirits of his party followers in this city, Hon. Dr. Baxter on Friday evening evolved a "joker." Like his Portland competition promise it is a truly inspiring declaration, committing not only himself and Hon. Arthur Meighen but the Conservative party. What he now promises is to make just one visit to Premier Meighen and "when I come back the Valley Railway will be the property of the Dominion of Canada and if I don't get that then I will no longer support or lend the support of my government to the Conservative party at Ottawa." That sounds as truly inspiring as the promise about Portland. It is worth just as much, but it roused the Conservatives to the highest pitch of enthusiasm. It is a pledge Hon. Mr. Baxter and his government and party can safely make for they know they will never be called upon to redeem it. Hon. Mr. Meighen is not going to be premier of Canada and Hon. Dr. Baxter will not have the opportunity to make that Ottawa visit. Hon. Dr. Baxter is a jolly political joker. The Liberal government with Hon. Dr. Foster as the minister from this province will deal with the Valley railroad problem, and instead of praising them for making it a part of the national system Hon. Dr. Baxter will lead in opposing their plans to take the road play a real part in the handling of Canadian trade.

#### THE VALLEY RAILROAD.

That Valley railroad promise by Hon. Dr. Baxter is a reminder that there have been Conservative governments at Ottawa since the Valley road was built. One of these governments was directed by Hon. Arthur Meighen. Then, as now, Hon. Dr. Baxter was a Meighen supporter. Then, as now, the people of New Brunswick, irrespective of politics, were urging the Federal government to take over that road and make it a part of the National system. Hon. Dr. Baxter promises freely for a Conservative government out of office, but the people of New Brunswick do not forget that a Conservative government in office had their chance. Instead of taking over the Valley road they made Portland a Canadian national port. Is it unfair to say that was what Saint John and New Brunswick might have expected from those who made building of the Valley road one of the greatest of the scandals in New Brunswick history? Is it unfair to remind Hon. Dr. Baxter that several of those whose names came unfavorably before the public in the investigation of that scandal, the timber scandal or the potato scandal are today candidates of his party in this election? Hon. Dr. Baxter knows what these scandals cost the province. He knows the amount they represent in the present debt and difficulties of New Brunswick today. Others know it also and that is why prominent Conservatives are not concealing their disgust over party nominations in several counties of this province. Liberals are not forced to apologize for the honor of their government or for the questionable political actions of any of their candidates. That is a worth while political asset to keep in mind when the Valley railroad is discussed.

Hon. Dr. Baxter when in Amherst, Nova Scotia, this week, was entertained at the home of Hon. Mr. McDonald, appointed by Hon. Arthur Meighen one of the Senators for New Brunswick.
