

## ESTABLISH NEW AQUATIC RECORDS

Weissmüller, Baner, Faricy and Kruger Perform Sensationally in Chi.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Establishment of four new world swimming records featured the formal opening last night of Loyla University's new pool, all four records being made by the Illinois A. C. team.

Johnny Weissmüller proved his comeback is a complete success by clipping two fifths of a second off his own mark in the 100 metre free stroke event, covering it in 59 1-5.

Sybil Bauer, women's back stroke champion and the only woman who ever bettered a man's record cut one and three fifths seconds off her own mark in the 100 yard back stroke, hanging up a new record of 1:14 1-5.

John Faricy, former intercollegiate breast stroke champion of Minnesota University, covered the 100 yard breast stroke event in 1:12 2-5, shaving one and one fifth seconds from the former mark.

Stubby Kruger swam the 50 yards back stroke in 30 flat, thereby cutting 4-5 seconds from his former mark.

LEONARD AND WALKER.

St. Louis, Nov. 7.—Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, announced here today arrangements were being made for a bout between Mickey Walker, welterweight champion, and himself. The bout probably will be next summer at a local convention not yet decided on.

N. B. Donohoe's home is in St. John and they probably will remain here for the holiday. In addition, Murray Angeline, captain of the Mount Allison team, may play.

A hitch has occurred in arrangements for the rugby game scheduled here for Friday afternoon between Hampton Consolidated and High School second team. According to Captain Fenton, of the locals, it was the arrangement that if High School went to Hampton a return game would be played in St. John. Yesterday, he claims, that Coach Dyar of the Hampton team notified him that the Hampton team would not come down here for the game. The local boy says that he had made arrangements to tender the visitors a supper here after the game and feels that Hampton is not playing fair in breaking its promise to play a return contest here.

## HARRY SULLIVAN IS NEW PRESIDENT

Popular Bowler to Head the Clerical League—Fine Trophy.

## FIRPO RETURNING.

New York, Nov. 7.—Louis Angelo Firpo will return to North America next spring for a series of about twelve fights in various parts of the United States and Canada, leading up to another match with Jack Dempsey for the world's heavyweight title, which probably will take place in New York around Labor Day. This announcement was made tonight by William McCamey, who with his partner, Hugh Gortland, will conduct Firpo's tour. Firpo is expected to return in April and start boxing early in May.
