PAPAL HONOR FOR ABBE CASGRAIN

High Decoration Conferred Upon Him Through Bishop LeBlanc—A Distinguished Career.

(New Freeman)
The many friends of L'Abbe Philippe Casgrain, a resident at the Bishop's Palace, St. John, until the close of the winter season, not only in St. John, but throughout Canada and in various parts of the world, will learn with pleasure that he has been made the recipient of a distinguished Papal honor, the decoration "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice," with the accompanying insignia.
Official notification of the awarding of the honor, by His Holiness Pope Pius XI, was received by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc during the week through the medium of the following letter:—
"Superior Council of the Propagation of the Faith, Palace of the Propagation of the Faith, Rome, April 11, 1923.
"Illustrous and Right Reverend, 'Lord Bishop—In your letter to the Superior Council forwarding the very generous offering collected in your diocese for the propagation of the faith, you particularly mentioned the contribution of L'Abbe Philippe Casgrain and expressed the wish that some person should be granted to this deserving priest. I made your desire known to His Holiness, who was graciously pleased to confer upon L'Abbe Philippe Casgrain the Cross Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice, and I now forward this decoration, together with the Papal Document which accompanies it, and beg Your Lordship to be-

stow them upon the worthy recipient. At the same time, I gladly avail myself of this opportunity to express my congratulations to the people of your diocese who have been among the first to send help to our foreign missions and I wish to express to them my deep gratitude for their generosity and noble example. Such action, on their part, affords us great consolation as the needs of our foreign missions are, indeed, very great and urgent. The donors may rest assured that God will repay them a hundredfold. I commend myself to Your Lordship's prayers and, begging your benediction, I reverently kiss your episcopal ring and remain your devoted servant in Christ.

sufficient four-pointed cross of solid gold with a beautifully engraved effigy of Pope Pius XI on one side and the inscription Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice on the other. It is suspended from a ribbon of heavy silk in the Papal colors. Accompanying the decoration was the official document of the award signed by His Eminence Cardinal Gasparri, Papal Secretary of State, and which reads as follows:
"His Holiness Pius XI has deigned to bestow upon L'Abbe Philippe Casgrain the Cross, Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice, and authorizes him to wear the insignia in the approved manner."
(Signed) "Cardinal Gasparri."
"March 31, 1923."
This official document is on a richly ornamental scroll engraved with the Papal arms.

His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc made the official investiture of L'Abbe Casgrain with the Cross expressing his congratulations and good wishes, sentiments that will be re-echoed in more continents than one, because L'Abbe Casgrain is one of the most widely traveled Canadians of the day.

As director of the Catholic Immigration Society of Canada, L'Abbe Casgrain is stationed at Quebec in the summer and at St. John in the winter. With the re-opening of navigation on the St. Lawrence, in the near future, he will soon be leaving St. John. A Distinguished Career.
The following is from the British "Who's Who," 1923:
"Rev. Philippe Henri Duperron Casgrain, C.M.G., born Quebec, May 31, 1864; educated Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont.; served in the North-West Rebellion as adjutant of the 9th Rifles (medal), 1885; Lieutenant R. E. 1888; Interpreter in Russia, 1893; Captain, 1894; Major, 1902; served in Manchu Expedition, 1901 (medal and clasp); Ordinance Survey, Bedford, 1891-95; served in South African War, mentioned in despatches and received two medals and five clasps; retired, 1907, studied for the priesthood in Rome; ordained, 1911; director Catholic Immigration Association; at outbreak of the war served as military chaplain, 1914, and then was placed on the general staff at War Office, London (despatches, Western Front, Gallipoli, etc.); C. M. G. Order of St. Stanislas, Russia." Father Casgrain is also the author of several books.

Premier To Address Graduating Class At University of N. B.

It was announced in Fredericton last evening that Hon. P. J. Veniot will deliver an address to the graduating class of 1923 at the encyclical exercises of the University of New Brunswick on Thursday, May 17. The exercises will take place in the assembly chamber of the Parliament building.
As announced before, the alumni orator will be Bliss Carman, of the class of 1881. Mr. Carman, in 1906, received the honorary degree of LL.D. from his Alma Mater. He is one of the most distinguished literary men among the U. N. B. graduates.

The faculty orator will be Professor Foster Baird, who will deliver the address in praise of the founders. The valedictory will be delivered by C. E. Burpee, of Edmundston.
The reunion which is to be held by graduates of the University will take place the week of Enciclica. On Wednesday, May 16, at the University, there will be a special gathering in that connection.
Sir George E. Foster will be the speaker of the occasion. Dr. E. M. Patterson, of the faculty of McMaster University of Toronto, also was invited to speak but has informed Chancellor Jones that he will be unable to attend. He is a graduate of 1878.

Lafayette, Ga., April 28.—Geo. Baker was hanged here today for his part in the murder of Sheriff Morton. About the same time it became known that E. Thomas Baker, his youngest brother, aged 12, had attempted suicide when he heard of the Governor's refusal to interfere with the death penalty.
