

## Better Results Here Than In Any Other Province

**Chairman of Canadian Good Roads Association Executive Pays High Tribute to Work of Hon. P. J. Veniot—Tells of Great Possibilities in Motor Tourist Traffic—Rule of the Road the Only Barrier.**

"How happy should this province be with a man like the Hon. Mr. Veniot as minister of public works, for Mr. Veniot has been able to obtain better results for the amount of money expended in the improvement of the roads of the province than has the minister of any other province." Such was the tribute paid last evening by S. L. Squire, chairman of the executive committee of the Canadian Good Roads Association, who is visiting New Brunswick to look over the road situation in this province and to arrange for New Brunswick representation at the annual convention of the association which is to be held at Victoria (B. C.) from June 13 to 16.

After commending the soundness of the road building policy of the provincial government in that it aimed to improve the trunk lines first and the lateral and byroads later, Mr. Squire declared that New Brunswick was not getting its full share of the tourist traffic. "There may be several reasons for this," he said. "Wide publicity has not been given to the fact of the improved state of the roads. New Brunswick still observes the 'drive to the left' rule and tourists avoid New Brunswick for that reason. But what has been done through the energy and initiative of people in other sections of the country is taken into consideration I think it is quite possible that the tourists who would come to New Brunswick would leave here \$1,000,000 annually."

There were at present, Mr. Squire explained, about 10,000 motor cars owned in the United States. Of these

more than 8,000,000 were within two days' run of New Brunswick.

The traffic census made by A. W. Campbell, highway commissioner of Canada, showed that during the year 1920 no less than 97,000 foreign motor cars came into Canada. Mr. Campbell estimated that the tourists who came in these automobiles and who remained in Canada for periods varying from one day to two months left at least \$27,000,000 in the Dominion. Of these 92,000 visiting automobiles in 1920, only 1,340 came into the province of New Brunswick and this despite the fact that about one-third of all the automobiles owned in the United States are owned by people living within a two-day run to New Brunswick.

**The Result of Enterprise.**

The astonishing stimulus that had been given international tourist traffic between the cities of Port Arthur and Fort William and the United States city of Duluth and the surrounding country was described by Mr. Squire. Only four years ago 160 miles of practically unsettled and roadless territory lay between Port Arthur and Duluth. But an energetic citizen of Port Arthur, J. W. Scott, conceived the idea of an international highway connecting the three cities and proceeded to convert his idea into an objective reality.

Port Arthur was about forty miles from the international boundary line between the Dominion and the Republic and this boundary line was marked in part by the Pigeon river, a stream about 300 feet in width that ran through a defile not unlike the gorge at Niagara.

The first problem was to throw a bridge across this river. Mr. Scott interested people in both the Canadian and American cities, the former putting up \$10,000 and the latter matching it with a like amount.

First the promoters thought that they should apply to both Washington and Ottawa for permission to build the international bridge but upon reflection came the conclusion that one or other of the governments would object on the ground that there were no customs between the two countries on either side of the line and no need for such a bridge. So they decided to build the bridge and ask the governments at it afterwards.

**An Outlaw Bridge.**

In accordance with this unconventional idea the bridge was built and the governments of both countries found themselves confronted with a "fait accompli", to continue the diplomatic terminology, when they were invited to build customs houses at their respective termini of the "Outlaw Bridge" as it has come to be known.

The road connecting the bridge with the cities on both sides of the line was built by private subscription from citizens of both countries and the traffic began to him along the "Scott highway" which will always remain as a monument to the vision of the man who conceived the idea of its construction.

As to practical results, Mr. Squire pointed out that last year about 9,000 United States automobiles passed over this wonderful road. If each automobile carried into Canada an average of four persons that meant 36,000 tourists into Canada and if each of them spent an average of \$10 in the Dominion that meant \$360,000 that came into this country through the Scott highway. This money might have gone elsewhere. "This shows what can be done by energy," said Mr. Squire.

**New Brunswick's Roads.**

This province had 15,000 miles of highways of which 1,300 were first grade, 8,200 second grade and the remainder by-roads, Mr. Squire said. There had been expended by the province \$370,000 on secondary bridges; \$730,000 on permanent bridges; \$392,000 on secondary

highways and \$800,000 on first grade or federal aid roads. This expenditure had resulted during the last year in improving or completing 135 miles of roadway.

In connection with the portion paid for road improvement by the federal government Mr. Squire pointed out that New Brunswick had already earned nearly seventy-five per cent of its federal allotment. This amounted in all to \$140,000 and the province had already qualified to receive \$840,000.

"The splendid work done by the minister in this province can be appreciated," said Mr. Squire, "when one considers that the province of Alberta has not yet qualified for a single dollar of its federal allowance."

**Policy Correct.**

While many of the rural population that lived on poor roads complained of the amount expended on main roads Mr. Squire said that in following this plan the governments were following the policy of the railroad companies whose policy it was to build trunk lines first and feeders afterwards. This principle has been recognized and practiced in New Brunswick. Roads that were of the greatest built first and he thought that it would be but a short time before all the feeders and by roads would be improved and there would be good roads throughout the whole province.

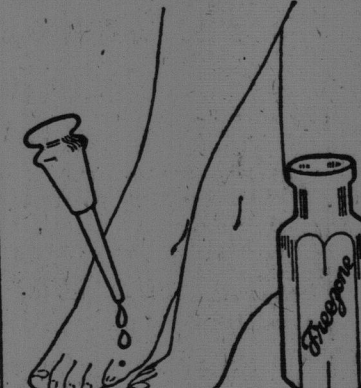

Fredericton officials of the city would be represented and Mr. Squire said he felt like suggesting the slogan: "See your British Columbia friends during convention time."

Nothing has so far been decided by the province at the meeting.

## IS CHARGED WITH THEFT OF CLOTH

The case in which Walter Northrup is charged with stealing cloth from the C. P. R. while in transit came up again in the police court yesterday afternoon. Four witnesses for the prosecution were heard and the case was then postponed to enable a witness to be brought here from Montreal.

J. Binet, a head checker for the C. P. R., was the first witness. He produced the bill of lading of the goods shipped via the steamer Metagama. He showed that one bale of cloth was checked as arriving at this port and being unloaded into No. 6 shed, but it was later found to be missing. He said that he later saw the same bale of cloth in the longshoremen's mess room at No. 6 shed. He produced a book to show that the accused was a member of the LeClair gang which had worked on the night of Dec. 6 when the cloth was stolen, from 7 to 11 o'clock.

W. Dumoulin, a C. P. R. checker, said that he happened to enter the longshoremen's mess room on Dec. 6 and found the open bale there. He said that he was dark and he took a light to match to ascertain the contents of the bundle. Sergeant Irvine, of the C. P. R. police, said that he went to the mess room on No. 6 shed early on the morning of Dec. 7. He found the wrapper used to bale the cloth and also seven pieces of the cloth. He said that he took the pieces under the weight called for in the bills of lading. He identified the cloth in court as similar to that found on the steamer Metagama.

Following this evidence the case was postponed until next Tuesday afternoon. H. H. McLean, Jr., appeared for the C. P. R. and H. W. Robertson for Northrup.

Formal acceptance of the offer of the Women's Hospital Aid to provide a social service worker for the hospital was made yesterday at a joint meeting of the committees appointed by the Hospital Aid and the Commissioners to act in the matter. The meeting was held at the hospital in the afternoon and those present were M. E. Agar, J. King Keller, and Mrs. J. V. McLellan, commissioners of the hospital, and Mrs. E. A. Hetherington, Mrs. Carleton Lee and Mrs. Morris, the delegation from the Hospital Aid.

An intimate of all details in connection with the employing of a social service worker and of the duties of such an official was entered into and there was an interchange of ideas regarding the whole situation. The commissioners accepted the offer of the hospital aid to provide the social service worker for the hospital and the commissioners to have full authority in regard to the scope and nature of the work.

No definite regulations for the governing of such a worker were to hand and the matter of preparing these was left to the committee of the commissioners.

The opening of this new department of the hospital work is in the nature of an experiment and neither the commissioners nor the hospital aid are looking further than the end of the year. By that time the work, it is expected, will have taken definite form and have declared its own value.
