### ROMANCE GOES AS BUSINESS COMES

Landmarks of Ancient Rome Must Give Way to Commercial Progress.

Rome, July 3.—(A. P., by mail.)—Only the god of commerce is grinding away a little at a time the romance and antiquity of this cradle of civilization. The Corso, from the time of Roman emperors the busiest thoroughfare of the city, is losing its ancient character. The huge triumphal arches which once lined the street, where destroyed centuries ago. Palaces and churches were, but the palaces are falling before the irresistible demands of commerce. Two huge old palaces occupying a site way up the Corso have already been torn down before the commercial engine. In their places have been erected two big, gaudy structures to be piled by banks, which stand out in contrast to the quiet coloring of the old gems of architecture. When the palaces are not torn down, are modified in such a way that the for decoration, some of which has the test of centuries, is effaced and times plastered. Numerous alterations are made to suit the necessities of the quarter where the church of St. Lateran is located, a new amusement company has taken possession of a square of vacant ground, and has erected carousels, roller-coasters, ferris wheels and side shows. The romance beauty of the spot has vanished.

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### CANADA BEATEN OUT BY CUBA

Exports From Both Countries to the United States Compared.

New York, June 22.—(By Canadian Press.)—"Canada has stepped down from her place as chief supplier of the United States last year," declared the New York World in a recent summary of international trade. "Cuba furnished commodities to this country amounting to more than \$721,000,000 in 1920, which was in excess of the imports to Canada by \$110,000,000," the World continued. "Of the total imports Cuba sent abroad 1.6, exactly 16.2 per cent. of the whole. "Canada sent 11.63 per cent. of the total coming through our custom houses. We shipped to Canada 11.8 per cent. of our total exports. We got 9.73 per cent. of our total imports from England, and to her we sent nearly 1-4 of our exports, or 22.18 per cent."



### SAYS IRISH USE A SUBMARINE

New York, June 21.—Two submarines, flying the "Irish Republican" flag maintain a regular undersea passenger service between this country and Ireland for officials and agents of the "Irish Republic," according to Captain B. J. Shanley, wounded veteran of the 69th Regiment of New York. He is also secretary of the New York Council of the American Association for the recognition of the Irish Republic. Eamon De Valera, "President of the Irish Republic" arrived in this country in 1919 in an Irish submarine, and several months ago in the same fashion.

### FLIES TEN METERS IN BICYCLE PLANE

Paris, June 22.—Successful flight in an airplane operated by foot has been unofficially credited to Gabriel Poulain, a noted French bicyclist. The feat was accomplished in official trials for the Peugeot prize of 10,000 francs to the first person to succeed in leaving the ground and flying ten meters with only human power. Poulain is reported to have repeatedly fulfilled the requirements for the award.

### CURB "LIZARDS" BARRED.

Newark, N. J., June 22.—Newark police have started a round-up of "lizards" who parade every evening flitting from the curbs of busy streets. The first arrest was that of "Smiling Joe" Ritchie, prize fighter, who got thirty days in jail for slapping a girl on the shoulder. Two other "lizards" were fined \$10 each.

### No Rail Wage Cut on July 1

Toronto, June 21.—There will be no wage reduction on Canadian railroads on Dominion Day. The Brotherhood representatives took the ground at the Montreal conference that they could do nothing about the proposed reduction until the big railway meeting in Chicago on July 1, dealt with the official award of the United States labor board recommending a reduction in wages of twelve per cent. on the railroads in the United States.

### WOULD JAIL SIR WM. MACKENZIE

Toronto, June 21.—This city's legal department is applying to the courts to send Sir William Mackenzie, president of the Toronto Street Railway and former president of the late Canadian Northern Railway, to prison. The sheriff has served notice on the traction magnate. This means that Sir William must appear to be examined by the city lawyers on his affidavit containing a counter claim to the city's claim for delayed percentages amounting to \$1,200,000, or he will run the risk of being committed to the county jail for alleged contempt of court.

### STONE CHURCH INVITES


REV. A. L. FLEMING
