

BACK TO SYSTEM OF TRADE AND BARTER

Lloyd Harris Astonishes Manufacturers Association—Some Tariff Matters

WHAT SIR SAM'S PRIVATE CAR COST

Bought For \$9,752 and Repairs at Cost of \$27,819 Made After Five Years

Toronto, June 12.—Lloyd Harris, Canadian trade commissioner, astonished the members of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association yesterday afternoon when he said that on account of the stringent financial conditions in Europe, the solution of the problem was to go back to the old Indian system of trade and barter. He instanced an offer from the Russian provisional government in southeastern Europe to exchange materials for Canadian goods, instead of paying money.

Ottawa, June 11.—Expenditures by the government on private cars with particular reference to the cost of Sir Sam Hughes' car, bought in 1912 when he was minister of militia, were probed yesterday in the common public accounts committee. S. W. Jacobs was the chief inquirer and Col. Charles Winter, assistant adjutant-general and formerly military secretary of General Hughes, the witness. In reply to a question Colonel Winter said that the car was purchased for \$9,752 by D. D. Haines of the Canadian Northern Railway in July 1912, in Chicago, for \$9,752. At the time repairs were made costing \$1,500. After using the car for five years the car was repaired in a cost of \$27,819.

The committee on tariff reductions favorably upon the principle of preferential tariffs within the empire. The committee said that if the demand of the grain growers were met widespread depression would result, and that the committee was convinced that the movement to secure these tariff reductions had in view, step by step, ultimate free trade with the United States.

On the subject of preferential tariffs within the empire the committee reported that it believed that the adoption of substantial tariff preferences among the British countries corresponding to the preferences provided in the tariff of Canada would effectively strengthen and consolidate the empire as a whole, but each constituent part.

Denial by Minister. Toronto, June 12.—Replying to a letter of inquiry from the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, Rev. Ernest Thomas, field secretary of the army and navy department of the Methodist church, declared that a report that he had stated before the industrial commission in Montreal that in going up to Canada he had frequently heard members of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association threaten to provoke strikes, is unfounded and was made by a reckless reporter.
