Robber Who Defied 'Dead Line' Caught

Chester Yates Arrested in Kansas City, Mo.; New York Crook Took \$87,000 From Broker in 1912

New York, June 25.—Chester Yates, who robbed Aaron Bancroft of \$87,000 in money and securities at the entrance of the Produce Exchange vaults in 1912, escaped without Bancroft finding out at the time that he had been robbed, and who made a daring escape from Sing Sing, has been captured.

Warden Edward V. Brophy of Sing Sing detected a telegram from Chester Yates, dated June 24, from Kansas City, Mo., that Yates had been taken there under the name of Charles Van der Auwergh.

The Kansas City police say they identified the prisoner as Yates by his Sing Sing photograph and Bertillon measurements.

Brophy said he will send the most careful guards he has after Yates, for the convict escaped from custody once before when arrangements were being made to take him back to Sing Sing.

The Bancroft robbery occurred on March 2, 1912. Bancroft, an elderly broker, was walking along a dim passageway with an envelope containing the money and securities in his hand. Yates and a companion, Charles Ross, bumped into him and knocked him sprawling.

With great politeness Yates picked up and returned the broker's hat and cane, but substituted an envelope stuffed with newspaper clippings for Bancroft's envelope.

The robbery was discovered when Bancroft went to the vaults again two days later. The police were especially wrought up over the robber's escape, because his act took place below "dead line," but did not get a clue until Dan O'Reilly, a lawyer, offered to get the stolen property back for a reward.

O'Reilly was arrested, charged with receiving stolen goods. Yates' arrest soon followed. O'Reilly was sent to Blackwell Island for three months and discharged.

Judge Mulgrew sentenced Yates to twenty-one years in Sing Sing. His escape on Dec. 15, 1912, after serving four months, was the most mysterious in the annals of the prison.

Samuel Gompers At Alberta Congress

Calgary, June 25.—Advices received at the headquarters of the Alberta Industrial Congress are to the effect that two trains of manufacturers who are members of the Dominion Manufacturers' Association will leave eastern Canada for the congress, arriving at Medicine Hat on August 11, the opening day of the big industrial convention and tour.

Advices received from the chamber of commerce at Minneapolis, indicated that a special train load of industrial men will leave the twin cities of Minnesota for the congress, as well as many individuals who will travel privately.

The congress is being given publicity throughout the continent as well as in the United Kingdom, and many visitors will come from as far as the Gulf of Mexico and England. Just what number will attend is not definitely known, but it is thought that there will be thousands in attendance and that the congress, which is really a series of small industrial conventions, with a central educational session at Calgary for two days, August 13-14, and linked up by special trains carrying the delegates and visitors, will be the greatest of its kind ever held in the Dominion, if not in the entire western portion of this continent.

It now seems quite certain that Samuel Gompers, the great labor leader, will attend and address the congress at Calgary on either August 13 or 14. A communication just received at the congress headquarters here indicates that Gompers will attend unless something unforeseen prevents it.

SPRUCE MARKET IS CLIMBING AND NEW RECORD IS PREDICTED.

Boston, June 25.—The market for spruce is climbing with an agility that corroborates all that many of the prophets of its late slump have been saying for some months. Dimension of cargo reached \$47 base recently and the general opinion of the experts is that it has still enough energy in store to break easily all war time records. The people who believed that an advance was due until the autumn have been startled, while those who refrained from buying, because they half believed that a decline was near, are suffering from sensations that suggest their blood is running cold.

Several of the wholesale merchants are in a quandary. It is not easy to find mills either in New England or the provinces who have more than a little spruce to offer for quick delivery, and it is more difficult to get in touch with any that quote for future delivery.

Traveling men who are ordinarily engaged in selling are now looking about to see where they can buy and are not meeting with much success. There is quite a little excitement in one way and another.

COUNCIL OF WOMEN IN BATTLE OVER USE OF PROXIES.

Regina, Sask., June 25.—The National Council of Women will continue the system of allowing delegates to carry votes from societies which are not sending delegates themselves to the annual council of women's meetings. Three divisions were taken last night on clauses concerning this subject. The main point was lost by a vote that differed by a single ballot. As a majority of two-thirds was required before any change could be made in the constitution, the motion for doing away with proxies was lost.

Agreement Reached.

An average increase of twenty-four per cent on the wage scale for men in the building trades in Halifax was decided in the findings of the board of arbitration yesterday. This is about eight per cent more than the employers offered. The new rates of the various trades will now be as follows: Carpenters and painters, 66 cents; plasterers and masons, 75 cents; electricians and plumbers, 70 cents per hour, these rates to continue until Dec. 31, 1920. The men are to receive the difference between the wage offered by employers on their return to work and the new scale.

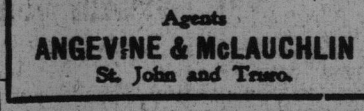

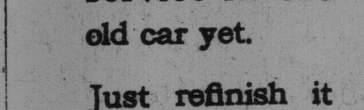
