The French. Paris, Oct. 24—French troops have crossed the Oise Canal opposite Long-champs. Between the Oise and the Serre we delivered an attack in the after-noon, and despite the resistance of the Germans our troops made an important advance south of Origny-Sainte Benoite and north of Villers Le Sec. On our right we have reached the road between Laferte-Chevresis and Ferrieres Farm. There was considerable active artillery Darkens Beautifully and Restores its Natural Color and Lustre'at Once.

On October 23 observation planes, in the course of numerous reconnaissances, proceeded about 48 1-2 miles inside the enemy lines. They brought back sev-eral hundred photographs. Two captive balloons were burned and twelve enemy machines were brought down or put out of action. The greater part of these suc-cesses were obtained in the region of the Aisine. 
