Here is a Partial Record of The Operations in Lunenburg County, N. S.

We notice that even at this early date many questions have been asked in the federal house respecting the dismissals and new appointments to office throughout the dominion. So numerous were the dismissals that a great deal of time will have to be spent in explanations. The explanations are due the country, and while the questions of dismissals and appointments are about to be inquired into, we would like to have Dr. Stewart make some explanations on the floors of the house about the dismissals in this county.

In order that they may be referred to in convenient form, we append a partial list: Henry Nais, keeper of the Battery Point Light, was dismissed and Robert Selig was appointed.

Benjamin Knack, shipping master at Lunenburg, was dismissed, and William Shupe appointed, despite any proof of partnership. Newton Myers, janitor of the Lunenburg Post Office, was dismissed, and Charles Dauphins appointed.

John Allen, Postmaster at First South, was dismissed, and Daniel Horse appointed.

Created a \$1,200 a year job in the Lunenburg Customs House for Mr. S. E. Mack, and every elector in the county is wondering how he finds enough to do to earn such a salary.

Dismissed Mrs. Forbes and Penny as medical attendants at the Lunenburg Hospital, and appointed Dr. T. D. Desbriay.
