TRANSPARENT PIE. Beat together one whole egg and the yolks of two others. Then add two tablespoons of melted butter, one cup sweet milk, one cup of brown sugar and one half of a grated nutmeg. Mix all together, beat thoroughly and bake with an under crust only. When done, cover with a frosting made of one half cup of sugar and the whites of two eggs, flavor with lemon and place in the oven for two or three minutes.

SOME of your hurts you have cured, and the sharpest you still have survived; But what torments of grief you endured From evils that never arrived! Emerson. LA MARQUISE DE FONTENAY The Promotion of Crown Prince William—The Story of the Scrope Family (Copyright, 1912, by the Brewster Company)

Crownprince William's promotion on July 4th, next (the sixth birthday of his eldest son), which carries with it the command of the Knigsberg Grenadier Regiment, will entail his moving to Konigsberg, which is seventy miles further from Berlin and Potsdam than Danzig, where he is now stationed. Naturally this has excited comment among those in Germany and abroad who believe that the Kaiser disapproves of his heir apparent in much the same way that the Empress Augusta-Victoria is said to have taken exception to the French man, Louis Bonaparte, and the spirit of Crownprince Cécile, who was brought up altogether in the South of France, by one of the most able of royal and imperial ladies, namely, her Russian mother, the widowed Grandduchess of Mecklenburg-Schwerin. It seems to have been almost a matter of tradition ever since the days of Frederick the Great that the heir to the throne of Prussia should be at odds with his father in politics, mind, and manner. The late Emperor Frederick, it may be remembered, was until his father's death in perpetual opposition to the latter's ministrations, and government in general, while the present Kaiser's troubles with his parents are still more generally known; so the public is naturally inclined to notice—and probably also to over-estimate—any incident that may point to a difference between him and his son.

Stephen Scrope, whose marriage to Miss Ethelburga Waterton is about to take place in London, is one of the Scropes of Danby, in Yorkshire, and a younger brother of the untitled chief of one of the most illustrious houses in England, which has figured in history ever since the days when Richard Scrope was one of the wardens of the Marches of Wales, in the days of King Edward the Confessor. Some thirty years ago or more, the late Colonel Simon Conyers Scrope, elder brother of Gertrude and Stephen Scrope, joined his father in laying claim to the Earldom of Wilts, bestowed by Richard II. in 1387 upon Sir William le Scrope who was Regent of England when Richard went to Ireland. When Richard was deposed by Henry of Bolingbroke, afterwards Henry IV., the Earl of Wilts was beheaded, as described by Shakespeare in Scene I. act III. of "King Richard II." The patent by which the Earldom of Wilts was conferred upon this ill-fated peer, who left no children, declares that the dignity would descend "to his heirs male for ever," or according to the Latin phraseology, "et hereditas suis masculis in perpetuum." The claimants could not show a direct descent from the Earl of Wilts, but only a collateral relationship; that is to say, descent from a common ancestor. A Latin phrase similar to that of the Wilts patent had been held some sixty years since to cover collateral descent, in the successful claim of William Courtenay to the Earldom of Devon. So when the late Col. Scrope's petition came before the committee of privileges of the House of Lords, and before the principal law officers of the crown, it was rejected, on the ground that the Latin phraseology, liable under any circumstances to be held to cover collateral descent, as it would be thereby creating a new form of inheritance and successions to peerages; that the draftsman who had drawn up the letters patent had, at the best, erred in using the words "et hereditas suis masculis in perpetuum," and that neither the crown nor the government could be bound by the mistake of a private draftsman. When Col. Scrope's lawyers cited as a precedent the case of William Courtenay, who had successfully based his claim to the Earldom of Devon on identical Latin phraseology, it was replied that all the precedents were against him, and that the committee of privileges of the House of Lords advised themselves to be wrongly advised by their presiding officer, Lord Brougham, then Lord High Chancellor, who knew absolutely nothing of the law, and by the then Attorney General, Sir Thomas Denman, who knew still less.
