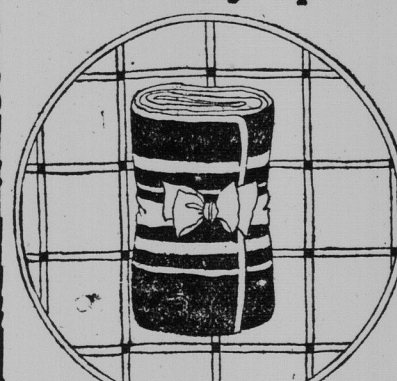

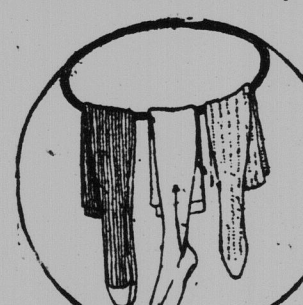

ALIMONY FOR MRS. STOKES

Court Allows Her \$1,500 a Year and \$7,500 Counsel Fees

New York, Oct. 28.—Supreme Court Justice Gargan has awarded \$1,500 a

year alimony and \$7,500 counsel fees to Mrs. Helen Ellwood Stokes in the suit for divorce brought by W. E. D. Stokes in which he names his son W. E. D. Stokes, Jr., and relatives of his wife as co-respondents. The court decided that because of statements by the plaintiff as to his decreasing income an allowance of \$1,500 which he has been allowing to his wife and two children will be sufficient. In granting the counsel fees the court said:

"Owing to the fact that several co-respondents are named and because of the inherent difficulty of meeting certain charges of an unusual character made by the plaintiff against the defendant, I am of the opinion that \$7,500

would be a reasonable allowance for counsel fees."

KEEP GIRLS ON FARM.

Addressing the convention of hundreds of farmettes who were meeting in Quebec last week, Hon. J. E. Caron, provincial minister of agriculture, made a strong appeal for the country girl to stay at home on the farm.

"There has been a movement of inter-est," said Mr. Caron, "to bring back the boy to the farm. I'll start another slogan, and it will be: 'Keep the girl on the farm.' Women of all classes in every walk of life should turn their attention to the farm."

He deplored the desertion of the country by young women who are lured into

towns and cities by high salaries. Women, he said, should be made to understand that their most alluring future lies on the farm. He eulogized the rural woman of Quebec, who sets to the whole world, he said, an example of devotion to the blessed role of motherhood. He recalled statements recently made in England whereby prelates urged the women of all the empire to copy the French-Canadian mother of large families.

Mr. Caron said that Ontario is at present suffering from a disastrous desertion of the farm by women, and said this can only have a serious and damaging effect on the economic situation of a country.
