DRY GOODS AND LADIES' WEAR

TWO AVIATORS KILLED.

John B. Moisant and Arch. Hoxsey Victims of Aeroplanes.

New York, Jan. 3.—John B. Moisant and Arch. Hoxsey, aviators extraordinary, were killed Saturday. Both fell out of the treacherous air currents with their machines—neither from a vast height and Moisant's remaining minutes of life were so few as to count as naught. Hoxsey was killed instantly.

Moisant met his death at 9.55 a.m., attempting to alight in a field a few miles from New Orleans; Hoxsey, who went into the air early in the afternoon at Los Angeles, at 2.12 p.m., was crushed into a lifeless mass in view of thousands who were watching the aviation tournament.

Thus, the last day of 1910, in bringing the total number of deaths of aviators to 35, capped the list with two of the most illustrious of those airmen who have been writing the history of aviation in the sky of two continents.

Both men met death in almost the same manner. Each machine was headed for the earth, and suddenly seemed to stop, hover in the air, then turn over onto its nose and dive headlong to the earth and to destruction.

Moisant's aeroplane was a Bleriot monoplane. In addition to the heavy engine in front of the main planes, he had fastened a tank holding 35 gallons of gasoline. Aviation experts believe a sudden puff of wind stopped his machine dead in the air and the heavy weight ahead dragged the light framework behind it, flipping the then useless rear elevator toward the zenith. From his position, partly back of the main planes, Moisant was flipped out, clear of the machine, and struck the ground on his head, breaking his neck. He died on a flat car on which he was being rushed to New Orleans.

Hoxsey likewise was returning from a journey into the clouds. He was within 500 feet of the earth, and cheers were going up to meet the conqueror of the higher air, when his machine seemed to stop, shudder, and whirl over and over to the ground. As in the morning's tragedy, the rear elevator, rendered useless when the momentum was gone, flipped around helplessly to aid the fated machine. Hoxsey vainly endeavored to right his craft by warping the main planes and by use of the rudder, but before sufficient momentum was gained the frail structure crumpled upon the earth, the heavy engine being torn loose.

Fighting the Sugar Trust.

New York, Jan. 3.—Three corporations and one individual defendant filed appearances yesterday in the U. S. Circuit Court, in reply to the Government's suit to dissolve the so-called Sugar Trust, under the Sherman law. Two score other defendant individuals and corporations, including the American Sugar Refining Co., have been granted extensions until Feb. 6 next for filing answers.

Those filing yesterday were the Menominee River Sugar Co. of Michigan, capitalized at \$25,000; the Union Sugar Co. of California, capitalized at \$1,500,000; and the Alameda Sugar Co. of California, capitalized at \$750,000. John L. Howard of San Francisco, president of both the Union and Alameda companies, filed his answer as an individual defendant.

Panama Commerce.

Washington, Jan. 3.—Commerce of the countries of North and South America and the necessity of their preparing for the opening of the Panama Canal will be discussed in their various phases at a Pan-American commercial conference to be held here during the week beginning Feb. 13 next, under the auspices of the Pan-American Union.

The purpose of the conference, as announced by John Barrett, director general of the union, is to awaken the commercial organizations, business men and general public of North and South America to an appreciation of the possibilities of Panama commerce, and the necessity of getting ready for the commercial changes which will be brought about by the opening of the Panama Canal.
