SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any ever-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, yet reserved, may be homesteaded by any person, who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made.

quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situate. Entry by proxy may, however, be made any Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

Duties.—(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so by living with father or mother, on certain conditions. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by living must notify the Agent for

Dr. Rudolph Straube of Philadelphia in an address challenged Dr. Samuel Dixon, head of the Pennsylvania health department, to spend a night in bed with him with a smallpox patient between them in order to prove his assertion that vaccination is of no benefit in preventing the spread of that disease.
