There was another good fruit market this morning. Berries were very plentiful but a little firmer in price. Red and black brought five cents per box, and thimble-berries six. Potatoes were again lower and are now selling for only fifteen cents per peck. Butter was scarce and a little higher in price, eighteen cents being asked for the best.

SHE IS BUILDING BOAT FOR BOAT WITH RUSSIA—STATEMENT MADE TO THE COMMONS.

London, July 23.—The eagerly expected statement of the First Lord of the Admiralty, Mr. Geo. J. Goschen, on the supplementary naval program, was made to-day in the House of Commons. He reviewed the original program, which was considered sufficient, when it was framed, being based upon the two-power system, that the navy of Great Britain would be equal to the combined fleets of any two powers. But in consequence of the action of Russia on the same system, the Government was compelled to supplement a supplementary program, paralleling the Russian increase of six battleships, which Russia proposed to begin in 1898. MUST GO AHEAD.

The Board of Health insists on a New Sewer on Lacroix Street.

There were present at yesterday's meeting of the Board of Health Chairman O. B. Hullin and Messrs. Dunlop, Wilmore, Dr. Baker and the mayor.

The chairman stated the meeting was called to consider and take action in the matter of a sewer on Lacroix street.

The city engineer's report on said sewer, dated July 11, which was presented to the council was read.

Dr. Baker was of opinion that Lacroix street is the only natural outlet for Edgar street sewer. Yet, owing to the exceptions taken by ratepayers, he considered postponement of action would be best until next meeting in order to give the petitioners an opportunity of being heard before the board.

Mr. Dunlop moved, seconded by Mr. Wilmore, report on Lacroix street sewer be adopted and that a new sewer be constructed on said Lacroix street as an outlet for Edgar street sewer as a sanitary measure, and the cost be charged up to the lands benefited. This carried.
