the Academy of Music yesterday afternoon. The annual convocation of Dalhousie University was held at the Academy of Music yesterday afternoon. The weather was most favorable, and the attendance was very large. Several eloquent addresses were delivered. Professor H. R. Mackintosh, of Edit

Professor H. a. machines, or burgh University, and Canon Liwyd, Vicar of All Saints' Cathedral, following upon G. S. Campbell's discourse, brought home to the audience the full significance of the influence of Dalhousie, aigniteance of the industrie of Databusie, not only in Nova Scotia, but throughout the entire Dominion.

Following the invocation by Rev. Dr. Forrest, President MacKenzie gave a brief

In his address President Mackenzie said "I want to bring to your attention the fact that we are celebrating this mouth the jubilee of our second birth.
