MARATHONS STILL IN WINNING VEIN DEFEAT ST. PETERS 8 TO 6

Third Game in Champion Series on Victoria Grounds Saturday the Best Yet -- With St. Peters Leading, the Winners Pile on 5 in the Eighth and Pull out -- Both Pitchers Effective -- Some Fine Individual Play.

The Marathons again did things to St. Peters in the third game of the series on the Victoria grounds Saturday afternoon, winning out in a fast, exciting game by the score of 8-6.

The pitching was the best seen here in the championship series. There were more strike outs and fewer bases given than at any previous game.

In the fifth hit by Rogers, F. Mahoney, C. McCormick and F. Dever were responsible for three runs coming in for St. Peters.

The Marathons opened the eighth with the score 5-4 in favor of St. Peters. Copeland and D. Malcolm added to the gloom by striking out.

In the ninth with two out, the Marathons added another run on hits by Bradbury and Titus.

St. Peters men were out in short order. C. McCormick and J. Dever at first, F. Dever hit for a base, but J. McCormick was struck out.

The Marathons came to bat in the first inning. Ramsey was given an ovation when he came up and started well by rapping out a two-bagger.
