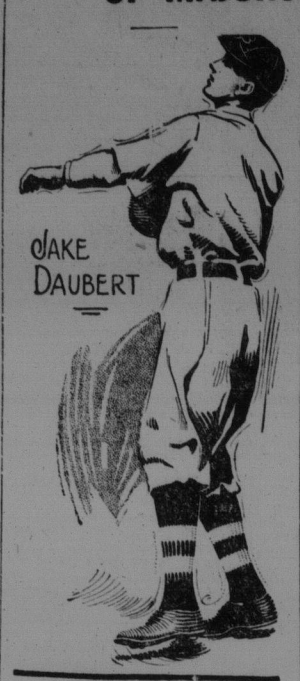
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DAUBERT IS HEADLINER OF MAJORS

U. S. WILL SEND TEAM TO GREECE

New York, May 15.—James E.
