## NEWCASTLE CIVIC ELECTIONS ON APR. 21

Ald. Falconer will be Candidate for Mayor—W.C.T. U. Public Temperance Meeting Addressed by Judge Ritchie.

Newcastle, April 6.—The 21st instant is civic election day, on which a mayor and eight aldermen-at-large are to be chosen.
