

GERMANS LOSE HEAVY BEFORE LA FERRE FALLS

NEW BRUNSWICK TO GIVE MILLION BAGS POTATOES

Fredericton, Sept. 3.—The province of New Brunswick will make a donation to the Imperial government of 1,000,000 bushels of the best New Brunswick potatoes for the use of the armies to the front. This gift which will entail an expenditure of upwards of \$50,000 has already been tendered the Imperial government through His Excellency the Governor-General and has been accepted with grateful assurances that it is most welcome. This gift will be a purely New Brunswick gift. Care will be taken to secure the very best varieties of New Brunswick potatoes and they will be sent forward as soon as possible. These food gifts of the different provinces are an important addition to the army commissariat and New Brunswick found out before tendering its offer that it would be gladly received.

"ON TO CANADA" CRY OF GERMAN RESERVISTS IN BUFFALO

Seven Thousand Reservists armed and feeling intense, Hamilton, Ont., man reports.

Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 3.—Scout Commander Heming, an ex-elderman who is busy engaged in organizing a home guard, told a startling story this morning of a small army of German reservists at Buffalo. "The feeling in the German section there is intense," he said, "and we have information that there are 7,000 armed Germans in Buffalo alone, who are better equipped than the New York state militia. The cry is often heard in German quarters in the states, 'on to Canada.'"

Every city in Canada, he said, should have a home guard to make up for the shortage, that will be felt in military quarters when the second call comes for troops to cross the water.

The many friends of Charles Symonds, a former St. John boy, now of Portland Place, London, who has made for himself a name as well as fame as a successful surgeon, will be interested to learn that both his sons lost no time in offering their services for their country, which were promptly accepted.

Mrs. Symonds in a letter recently received from her writes: "As you say, we are in the midst of troublous times indeed. Both the boys got jobs in the service within four days of the day war was declared. Charlie has gone across with the first expeditionary force as a corporal in the Royal Engineers, a motor cyclist dispatch rider, and Jack got a commission in the Army Transport. We thought we were going to keep him in England for a time, but he got orders to proceed to Havre on the 17th August."

LA FERRE CAPTURED AFTER BLOODY BATTLE; RUSSIA SENDING AID TO SERBIA

Valley of the Somme has been Abandoned by the French — Great Numbers of Wounded Reaching Berlin show Havoc Allies Wrought on German Attackers.

Paris, Sept. 3 (4.32 p. m.)—An immense and complicated system of entrenchments is being constructed outside the city. It is reported that the engineers in charge of the work are keeping several hundred thousand men busy.

PRESIDENT POINCARÉ AT CABINET AT BORDEAUX.

Bordeaux, France, Sept. 3 (By way of Paris, 5.45 p. m.)—President Poincaré, and the members of the French cabinet arrived here today and were greeted by immense and cheering crowds. They have established headquarters for the government.

President Poincaré has taken a residence in the Prefecture. The ministry of war is located in one of the buildings of the University of Bordeaux.

Trains from Paris are arriving every half hour bringing the members of the foreign embassies and legations and numerous functionaries of the state.

None of the newspapers had mentioned the decision of the government to come here, and yet every one in the city appeared to know what was transpiring and the very hour at which the party from Paris might be expected.

The hotels, boarding houses and private homes are overcrowded with the new arrivals who, including officials of various grades, number probably 5,000.

Halifax, Sept. 3.—The Provincial Workmen's Association today contributed \$100 to the Nova Scotia patriotic fund. Bulletin—London, Sept. 3 (3.01 p. m.)—An undated French despatch to the Times says: "The Valley of the Somme has been abandoned. La Ferre has been taken, after a bloody combat. We were obliged to retire Saturday evening."

ANOTHER LLOYD LINER PRIZE OF BRITAIN?
London, Sept. 3.—The following cryptic message has been received from Brisbane, capital of Queensland, Australia: "Room's passengers arrived, and give thrilling account of their experiences."

It is assumed that a censor has held up an early message regarding the Roon.

The North German Lloyd steamer Roon sailed from Antwerp on July 15th for Sydney, New South Wales, and was last reported as arriving at Colombo on July 30. The fact that her passengers have reached a British port suggests that the German steamer may have been seized by a British warship.

CANADA'S OPPORTUNITY SIR GEO. FOSTER SAYS

Toronto, Sept. 3.—Sir George E. Foster, who was today the chief guest at the Toronto exhibition luncheon, delivered a forcible address, in which he suggested that instead of closing down factories and laying off men, the manufacturers and industrial owners of Toronto should seize the opportunity to extend the fields that the war offered. Canadians have, he said, already competed successfully with Germany, and it was now both their opportunity and duty to go out to the German markets, and wrest the trade from them.

Sir George Foster also predicted better times for the farmers, who now would get much more for his products.

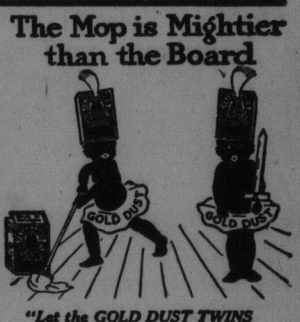
