POTATO SURPLUS OF ONE MILLION BUSHELS HERE

Hon. Martin Burrell States, on April 15, N. B., P. E. I. and Alberta Held This Amount.

Ottawa, May 1.—In reply to a question by A. B. McCool, West Kent, in parliament today, Hon. Martin Burrell, minister of agriculture, stated that at the end of February there was in Canada one and a half million bushels surplus potatoes over food requirements. The potato surplus was held chiefly in Alberta, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. From then until April 15 there had been exported one-half million bushels, leaving one million bushels surplus. This information had been communicated to the several provincial ministers of agriculture.

Sir Thomas White, in reply to a question by Frank Glass, East Middlesex, stated that the government had not received any request for the suspension of the operation of the Lord's Day Act in regard to farm labor during the seeding.

E. M. MacDonald, Picton, brought to the attention of the government a statement made at Lindsay by Sir Sam Hughes that a year ago Sir Robert Borden, alarmed at the labor scarcity, had decided that there be a relaxation of enlistment for the army. Sir Thomas White in reply stated that the question better be asked of the prime minister, but as far as he knew there was no foundation for the statement.

LOCAL BASEBALL.

On the Barrack Square, yesterday afternoon the Beavers defeated a picked team from King Edward School by a score of 4 to 2. Kerr and Begg, and Koe was the battery for the winners; Jones and Hoop for the losers. The use of the square was obtained through courtesy of the regimental sergeant major.

BASEBALL SITUATION.

New York, May 1.—President Ben Johnson, of the American League, announced here this afternoon that in case the war continued until next spring there would be no attempt to open the 1918 season.

President John Tennesse of the National League said that he had not discussed the proposition to drop baseball at the close of the present season, and that such action would depend upon the developments of the next few months.

TO BE JUDGE AT RACES.

Toronto, May 1.—Mr. Peter Clinch, of St. John, N. B., will be the presiding judge at Woodbine and Blue Bonnets this spring. Mr. Clinch is a prominent horseman in New Brunswick, but has never before held an office with the C. E. Clubs. He takes the place of Judge Nelson, who this season succeeds Judge Murphy as the C. A. R. representative in the stand at the different tracks.

HOME RULE POSTPONED

London, May 1.—Premier Lloyd George's statement as to the government's proposed solution of the Irish problem has been postponed until next week because of unforeseen circumstances. This announcement was made in the House of Commons today by Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer.

Replying to a question by Sir James Henry Dalziel, Liberal member for Kirkcaldy Burghs, as to when the premier proposed to make a statement on the government's intention to effect an Irish settlement, Mr. Law said:

"I am sorry again to make a claim on the indulgence of the house in this matter. Owing to circumstances which could not be foreseen it is impossible for him to make a statement, but before the end of the week I will name a date, next week on which the statement will be made."

FRENCH AND GERMANS TO WITHDRAW PRISONERS.

London, May 1.—A despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company, from Amsterdam says official advice received from Berlin are to the effect that the French and German governments have agreed to withdraw prisoners to 30 kilometers (18.64 miles) behind the front. The announcement adds that the new order would begin today.



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THIRTY WOMEN ARE KILLED

London, May 1.—Thirty women workers have been killed by explosion in a munitions factory at Troisdorf, a town of Rhenish Prussia, near Cologne, according to a despatch from Amsterdam to the Central News Agency.

AN ALLEGED PLOT TO PUT BOMB IN WALL ST.

New York, May 1.—Two German employees of Roosevelt Hospital—Wolf Hirsch, an assistant chemist, and George Meyringer, a general utility man—were arrested last night, charged with having a bomb in their possession.

The police said they had received earlier in the day information of an alleged plot to explode a bomb in Wall Street, with the object of creating a panic at the stock market opening tomorrow.

Hirsch, upon whom the bomb is alleged to have been found, and Meyringer, were taken into custody, according to the police, as they were about to board an elevated railway train bound for the financial district.

Hirsch, it was charged, constructed the bomb from a tin can and chemical ingredients taken from the hospital laboratory.
