Montreal Lady Succeeds at Last in Gathering Up Her William at Moncton.

Moncton, June 26.—The culmination of a domestic difficulty which has been simmering all winter has just been reached here. A "persistent" lady from Montreal who has been endeavouring to have her husband, one William Anglessey, an employee of a contracting firm here, return to that city has succeeded in carrying him off. At first William objected to shaking the Moncton mud off his shoes, in spite of the fact that his spouse sent him his car fare on several occasions.

Finally Mrs. Anglessey came in person and presented herself before William after the chief of police had informed her where Anglessey could be located.

The police supposed that this ended their connection with the case, but they had another thing coming for at midnight a violent ring at the telephone came from the Montreal woman. She informed them that William had fled from his boarding house in trousers and shirt. He must have found the night air too cool to suit him for he returned and is now on his way to the metropolis on the St. Lawrence.

BIG FIRE AT CURLING.

Curling, Nfld. June 26.—Fire at Middle Arm, near here today destroyed Platt's herring packing plant, several saw-mills and other property. The flames at one time threatened to sweep the whole village, and women and children were sent across the Arm in boats to points of safety. No
