**City Will Pave Prince William St.**

Has Material and Men Ready—Dr. Walker Thanked for Service on Hospital Commission—Water and Sewer Extensions.

At the council meeting yesterday Com. Frink moved that the work of paving Prince William Street be undertaken by the City at an estimated cost of \$1,877.50, as recommended by the former, as Commissioner of Public Works on the 9th April last, to be paid by Bond Issue, and that none of the tenders submitted be accepted, but that the deposits be returned.

Com. Thornton said there was nothing to show that paving would be effected by the city doing the work. Com. Frink said the city had the asphalt and the blocks, and a lot of former employees in need of work. Com. Thornton—Can you do the work cheaper than a contractor? Com. Frink—I think so. The contractor would figure on a profit anyway.

The Road Engineer said the city's estimate for the work was \$5,000 less than the lowest tender. The motion was adopted.

An over-expenditure of \$149.50 on cleaning-up day was ordered paid. Edward Mooney was given permission to erect an electric sign at No. 39 King St.

Com. Frink was authorized to lay a 6 ft. concrete sidewalk on Millidgeville Ave. from Adelaide Street to Hope Walk Corner.

The Canadian Municipalities Union wrote that the usual convention would be held in Quebec on July 27 to 29. Referred to Mayor.

The Board of School Trustees were protesting against a street car track being laid along Union Street past the High School. This was laid on the table pending consideration of proposed street railway extensions.

Dr. Thomas Walker sent in his resignation from the Hospital Commission. Com. Thornton moved that a letter be sent Dr. Walker expressing the city's appreciation of his services. Adopted.

Com. Jones moved that the water be extended to the Sterling Realty property on Erie street at a cost of \$10. Adopted.

Com. Jones moved that water and sewer mains be extended to the property of F. B. Hayes on Mt. Pleasant Court. Adopted.

Com. of Finance reported payments for May amounting to \$146,763; and recommended payment of following departmental accounts: Treasury \$442; Safety \$1,184; Works \$1,132; Water and Sewerage \$2,899; Harbors \$3,961. Lot 422 Guys Ward was sold to Ella M. Bury for \$450.

Tenders of J. S. Sprout and J. E. Wilson (Ltd.) for repairs to public library were accepted.

Following accounts were ordered paid: J. Willard Smith, hemlock deals \$693; Fred Doyle & Sons, examining Union wharf \$490.
