### INQUEST INTO DEATH OF MRS. GREEN THURS.

Sheriff Foster Empanels Jury to Enquire into Somerville Tragedy.

### VICTIM LEAVES SEVEN CHILDREN

Byron Ross, Who Was Driving Car Which Struck Her, Did Everything Possible.

Hartland, N. B., June 27.—A coroner's inquest into the death of Mrs. Gordon Whitman Green of Lakerville, who died last evening from injuries sustained when she was struck yesterday afternoon at Somerville, across the St. John River from Fredericton, by an automobile driven by Byron Ross, son of Dr. D. W. Ross of Fredericton, will be held on Thursday, June 30th.

Sheriff Albion Foster, who is also a coroner, is conducting the inquest and a jury who had been summoned viewed the remains this morning before they were removed from here for burial. The inquest was then adjourned until Thursday morning, when a large number of witnesses will be in attendance.

### Leaves Seven Children.

Mrs. Green, who was 35 years of age and the mother of a family of seven small children, the youngest of whom is only two months old, left her home at Lakerville yesterday with some friends who came along in a car to go to the memorial service for the soldiers of the district in Hartland, and the journey was made as far as Somerville without incident. The car was then stopped alongside of the road a short distance from another car which was facing in a different direction, while some minor repairs were being made. Several of the women in the car got out to cross the road to a place to sit down and Mrs. Green, following them when she was struck by the Cadillac car driven by Mr. Ross and knocked down.

Members of the party afterwards said that the car driven by Mr. Ross was apparently running about twenty miles an hour as it passed along the road by the stalled cars and Mrs. Green, as she walked around the rear of the car in which she had been riding, was unaware of its approach.

### Brought to Hartland.

Mrs. Green suffered a broken leg, a fractured hip, a broken arm and nose, and it was also thought at the time that her neck was broken. There were also multiple bruises as well as lacerations. It was about 1.30 p.m. that the accident occurred and the unfortunate woman was brought to Hartland by Mr. Ross in his car for treatment by Dr. L. D. McIntosh and she died at his office at 8 p.m.

### Rotarians Visit French Battlefields

Advance Guard of Canadian and American Visitors is Now in Paris.

Paris, June 27.—Many Canadian and United States Rotarians arrived in Paris today in advance of the main body of the delegates who are expected to reach here Friday and Saturday for their official visit to France.

An extensive program is being arranged for the visitors. This will commence with services at the French Protestant church in Paris next Sunday morning. More than four hundred delegates are expected to come to Paris. British Rotary Clubs also have been invited.

The delegates will be received by the municipality of Paris, July 5. They will visit the battlefields and also attend a number of social functions given by the Rotary Club of Paris. The visit will culminate in an official banquet, which will be attended by representatives of the French Government.

F. S. Huntley, general of F. S. Huntley was held today. He was 74 years old, and died after ten days' illness of pneumonia. He was well known not only in Truro, but in many parts of Colchester and Pictou counties, where his work as general agent for the Great West Life carried him.

He was born at Medford, Kings county and came to Truro, 23 years ago. During most of his life he was actively engaged in selling life insurance and was a salesman of marked ability. The Great West Life, for which he was agent for many years, had arranged to have next month called "Huntley month" as his birthday would come in that month.

In his immediate family he is survived by his wife, four sons and three daughters.

### Born in Province 107 Years Ago

Mrs. Geo. Debeck, of New Brunswick, Celebrates Birthday in Vancouver.

Vancouver, B. C., June 27.—Mrs. George Debeck, of Marpole, near here, today is celebrating her 107th birthday. She is the oldest woman in British Columbia and possibly the oldest in Canada. Mrs. Debeck was born in Canterbury, N. B., on June 27, 1814, and came to British Columbia fifty-three years ago. Of a family of twelve children, five are still living, the eldest surviving child being eighty years old. Mrs. Debeck still enjoys good health and is in possession of all her faculties.

### Reloated Steamer Towed into Halifax

"Bassan" After Many Sensational Experiences off Nfld. and St. Pierre is Safe.

Halifax, N. S., June 27.—The United States Shipping Board steamer Bassan was towed into the harbor here tonight by the tug Cruiser, Captain Arthur Fride. The Bassan, a steamer of 1533 tons figured frequently in last winter's casualty lists. While on her way to Newport News, Va., in January last she was forced to put into St. John's, Nfld., for repairs. Her voyage further difficulties developed and she put back to St. John's. The tug Ballenas was sent to tow her to Halifax, but encountering heavy weather on her way back with the Bassan, she put into St. Pierre where the tow was driven ashore in a gale. Recently the Bassan was reloated.

### Cases Dealt With in Police Court

Unlawful Liquor Dealer Gives Information Against Three Others.

Charged with being drunk and also with driving a motor car while under the influence of liquor into a fire hydrant on King street, J. B. Donavan was fined \$8 in the police court yesterday morning, and allowed to go with the understanding that the damage done to the hydrant be paid for.

The case of G. Langbein, charged with embezzling from the "Lombarders" Association, was resumed. J. J. Donavan, president of the association, stated that Langbein was bonded for \$2,000 by the Fidelity Guarantee Co. of Montreal, but that none of the missing moneys had yet been recovered from the company. The action taken against the accused was done by the executive without consulting either the association or the bond company.

Thomas Ramsey was fined \$300 for selling liquor unlawfully. He did not pay his fine so was remanded to jail.

Three juveniles arrested on the charge of breaking and entering the restaurant conducted by Mr. Carroll, in Union street, were before the court. The magistrates lectured them and remanded them to jail.


### INCOME TAX JUNE 30

Halifax, N. S., June 27.—Nine days out from Glasgow the Anchor Line steamer Cameronia docked at this port tonight. After landing one hundred and thirty passengers here tomorrow morning, the steamer will proceed to New York with 432 passengers. Frank Duncan, of Glasgow, one of the Cameronia's stewards, died very suddenly early this morning and was buried at sea, with Masonic honors. He was 49 years of age, and unmarried. The voyage was otherwise uneventful. The Cameronia was slightly delayed by fog.

### George W. Pugh Was Hit By Lightning

Injuries Sustained While He Was Milking Cow in the Barn.

Fredericton, N. B., June 27.—Geo. W. Pugh, of Nashwaakias, was struck by lightning and rendered unconscious early on Sunday evening during an electrical storm which swept down the St. John River valley and over Fredericton and vicinity and was marked by one especially severe shock. Mr. Pugh was in one of the barns on the dairy farm conducted by his father, Geo. L. Pugh, and was milking one of the cows. He was knocked over by the shock and rendered unconscious, while his brother, Rap Pugh, who was also in the barn, was also knocked over by the shock. The father, who was also in the barn, was uninjured and he hurried to the assistance of his sons, at the same time summoning Mrs. Pugh from the house. They did what they could and Ray soon revived, the shock having struck him on the ankle and not appearing to injure him otherwise, but it was three-quarters of an hour before George resumed consciousness. This morning it was said he had rested well and appeared to have almost completely recovered.
