





EXPORTS TO ORIENT AND OCCIDENT

CHARLES DICKENS once said that the Lord must love the common people or He would not have made so many of us. If this logic be true, the Asiatics should be especially favored as Asia contains over half the world's population. A study of Canada's export figures shows, as illustrated, that we are devoting our commercial energies chiefly to the smaller part of the world.
