To the Editor of the Times.

Sin—In publishing letters on Emigration like those signed by "A Bohemau," it must be taken for granted that you are anxious to give the public true and useful information, and that you will not allow your columns to be degraded to the use of a fictionist, however clever or instructive his stories may be. The only way in which the correctness of such narratives can be tested is by reference to general questions of fact.
It is scarcely possible to dispute the details of a story put forth with such apparent fairness and definiteness.
