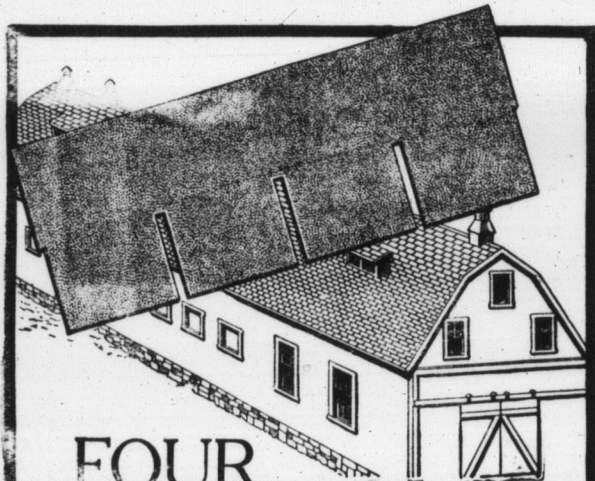

Cities, towns and villages are in a good many cases heaving men of spirit and dash to locate within their bounds and open up shops or factories whose output will supply a need and fill a want among the human family. Glencoe might be a centre for a flax mill, salt business, furniture factory, brick and tile manufactory, lime kilns. Hydro power should set many a wheel in motion and make enterprises prove of real value to the locality as well as to the promoter who usually desires to see such things go. Talk it over with the Industrial Board.

THE SITUATION

If no one works, none can eat. That is a condition of human life. The less work is done, the less there will be to eat.

Canada owes more money as a nation than she ever did before.

She has to carry obligations of honor arising out of the war of a kind and to an amount never before dreamed of.

War conditions have been accompanied by a riot of expenditure.

The money was first borrowed before it could be spent. Now the interest must be earned if it is to be paid.

Production must be increased or the country cannot pay interest and wages and provide for necessary expenditures.

Production must be relieved of all possible burdens, and must be expanded by the more efficient application of industry or Canada will cease to be a country.

Canada can only be saved by the increased industry and better directed efficiency of her citizens.—Edmonton Bulletin.

Council adjourned to meet at 10 a. m. May 26th as a court of revision of the assessment roll and ordinary business.

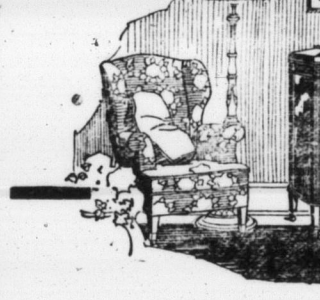

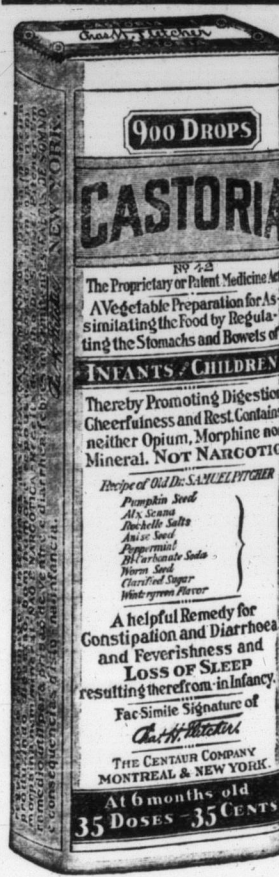
