RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY BOARD OF TRADE

Delegates Appointed to Join Deputation to Wait on Premier.

FAVOR FIVE HYDRO. ELEC. COMMISSIONERS.

The the municipalities of Ontario engaged in the distribution of electrical energy as a public undertaking have, in conjunction with the Commission, been responsible for the unprecedented success of the present system of power distribution to the sections of the Province so served; and

That those municipalities have a very large investment in this project as well as a very heavy capital liability in connection with the work of the power transmission system; and the immense sums that are being guaranteed in connection with Hydro Electric Railways; and

That those municipalities, although bearing all the financial responsibility, have no direct representatives on the Board of Commissioners, who are the trustees of this great enterprise; and

That owing to the increased operations of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission and the immense investment involved, we feel that it is desirable that the Board as now constituted being of a temporary nature, should be made of a more permanent character to insure the continuity of service and policy of the Hydro-Electric system;

Therefore be it resolved that Legislation be introduced to provide for the election by the municipalities using Hydro-Electric energy, of one member of the Board of the Hydro-Elec. Power Commission; and

That the Board shall consist of three members only: Sir Adam Beck, K.B., present chairman of the H.E.P. Commission, be made permanent chairman, one member from the municipalities and one member from the Government; and

MAKE BREAD MAKING DAY

Toronto, Nov. 25.—Hon. Walter Rollo, Minister of Labor, to-day heard a deputation of the bakers union demanding that bread baking all over Ontario be made day work by law. Consideration was promised.

The opposition to-day work is said to hinge solely on the matter of getting an extra two loaves of bread from each barrel of flour. This is the case in the baking of bread at night, as this bread not having had sufficient time to properly vaporize, contains practically ten per cent. more water than it would, had the baking been done 24 hours earlier. The consumers would then get ten per cent. more bread, and an equal percentage less water.
