- Feb. 25 Canadian Army casualties on the western front from June 6th to the end of 1944 were 31,096.
- Feb. 25 Provost Corps personnel and R.C.M.P. encountered difficulty in an attempt to round up draft dodgers and army deserters in Drummondville, P.Q.
- Feb. 26 Defence Headquarters announced that the first of two winter exercises by the Canadian Army in Northern Canada has been completed.
- Feb. 27 An Army badge that will identify the wearer as a member of Canada's Reserve Army has been issued by the Department of National Defence.
- Feb. 28 The Honourable L. St. Laurent, when asked to comment on methods used by R.C.M.P. at Drummondville, said he had not read the report of the session "but I feel quite sure that the Mounted Police proceeded with their usual careful methods in carrying out their job".
- March 1 The Canadian Army now has a full company of Canadianborn Chinese soldiers in training in Canada.
- March 4 Defence Headquarters announced that Pte. W. H. Smith had been given eighteen months; detention after he pleaded guilty to charges that he threw his rifle and two kit bags into the sea during a recent troop movement to England.
- March 4 The Canadian military government staff of the first Canadian Army now is functioning in Germany, dealing with the problem of what to do with the German civilians in the conquered lower Rhineland areas.
- March 5 Canadian troops serving with the Australian army were welcomed and complimented by General Blamey, commander of the southwest Pacific ground forces, when he inspected them on a recent tour of the Pacific areas.
- March 5 The Honourable A.G.L. McNaughton announced that Major General J. H. Roberts is to take up the appointment of Chief Administrative Officer, Central European District of the Imperial War Graves Commission.
