Dear Mr. Kingland:

On August the 3rd you very kindly sent out instructions with reference to the movement of my private car one hundred, and, amongst other things, arranged for a wire to be sent to the conductor on train number four, from ^{which} Forest's en route to Ottawa, asking to be advised if my nephews, who were expected to come on that train, were aboard the train, so that no delay might be occasioned in the movement of my car from Toronto to Ottawa, immediately upon the arrival of the train from Chicago. I enclose herewith copies of the message you sent and a copy of the reply which came from Mr. H.C. White to Mr. W.S. Wilson, Station Master at Toronto. (My nephews were aboard the train that I expected them to come by, and I cannot understand how the conductor in charge of number four could have made the mistake of having the enclosed wire sent to Toronto, or how he could have permitted it to have been sent.
