HOME FURNISHING.
ARTISTIC AND PRACTICAL IDEAS FOR
THE COUNTRY HOUSE.

Painted furniture has been revived
during the past few years in bedroom
sets for the country house. Natural
designs of flowers are now added as a
decoration, helping to name the differ-
ent sleeping rooms—the pany cham-
ber, nursery room, etc.

Dining rooms in the country are of-
ten furnished now in the white paint
of colonial times. Tables and chairs

are following the idea in white enamel
paint, and an old set of furniture that
must be refinished may receive the new
treatment in preference to the shellac
and stain. In a white dining room the
cool effect will be furthered with blue
linen hung at the windows, a white
and blue paper applied to the walls
and a Scotch rug of blues and greens
laid on the floor.

A lounging chair brought from the
West Indies by tourists, who found it
delightful for warm weather, has been
imitated successfully in our own hand-
made willow, with a shelf added for a
cup and a glass and a pocket for sup-
plying in a newspaper or magazine. With
cushions and pillows properly adjusted
the chair is almost as comfortable as a
bed and picturesque from whatever
angle it is seen.

The covering of the interior walls of
houses out of town may be less re-
strained than that chosen for the city
residence. Some radical departures
are possible with the crown patterns
that take the place of the old time
fringe, the square trellis that super-
seded the diamond shaped lattice, hunt-
ing and stagecoach scenes that follow
tapestry designs and imitations of
wash goods—dimities, ginghams and
canvases—instead of burlap.

In one summer home where space
was insufficient for the dresser and
clever device combined both pieces of
furniture. A pine board the width of
the machine top was fastened to four
legs that raised the board above the
open works of the machine. A long
roll of muslin was tacked around the
top of the board, and when the ma-
chine was not in use this attachment
served as a dressing table to hold
brush, comb and the smaller articles
for the toilet.

Cretonne has held its popularity for
many years as a hanging for bedroom
windows and for covering furniture.
Its usefulness is being lately extend-
ed into the living rooms of the summer
homes, and a parlor or drawing room
is often seen with flowered coverings
on chairs and sofas.

Hand printed linens make artistic
covering for upholstered summer fur-
niture. New ways for using linen ta-
fetas are constantly being discovered.
It has been adopted for furniture, ei-
