

Winnipeg Live Stock

Figures on last week's run at the stock yards have not been compiled in time for publication. The totals for the week were about the same as the previous week. Total receipts to Thursday were: 6,128 cattle, 938 hogs and 160 sheep.

Cattle

The tendency of the market this week was toward a weaker level, especially upon the lower and in between grades which were in very poor demand. The weakness was caused by the continuance of heavy receipts. In spite of pre-season estimates which placed the run of cattle at much smaller figures than previous years this season has seen more cattle come to the yards than ever before, and prices have really held up in good shape in comparison with past performances. Really choice butcher animals are and have been at all times in good demand at pretty fair prices, and reductions which are at present taking place can be blamed upon a lowering in quality rather than a reduction in demand.

Prices for exporters continue rather weak and dealers state that over-seas buyers will have to raise their prices before we can look for any strengthening here. Prices for feeders and stockers look another tumble this week, the season when they are in the best demand having passed. However, prices are fairly satisfactory for any who have this class of animal to market. The run of calves was larger than for some time and prices show a decline.

Butter

CHICAGO WHEAT

(Nov. 14)

Indications of a strong arm under the market had a more powerful effect in the wheat pit today than open selling by the interests that have led the buying for more than a week. The close was a net gain of 1 to 1. Corn and oats ended at the same figures as Saturday, or with an advance of 1.

There was a restless feeling in wheat all day, with a tendency to follow domes-

tic bull news, especially during the last hour. Duluth exports and Minneapolis and Kansas City milling purchases afforded much help in the hoisting of prices. Rains hampering the Argentine harvest were also against the bears. Another source of strength was the fact that considerable wheat was being taken here for shipment east before the close of navigation. Some emphasis, too, was laid on the continued dry weather in the southwest. Profit taking led to several reactions, but the day's developments were by no means wholly one-sided.

World shipments loomed big and huge increases were shown in the visible supply. Nevertheless, each set-back proved only temporary. Corn hardened with wheat and because of predictions of snow. On the other hand consignments were decidedly on the increase.

The fact that shipments from primary points generally overtopped receipts held up the price of oats. Pit trading was light.

MINNEAPOLIS WHEAT

(Nov. 14)

There was much backing and filling in the market, with no general desire for the trade to make commitments either way in any volume. Sentiment is still rather bearish because the statistics continue to add a weekly load to the visible supply of the cereal in all positions, but the selling pressure finds its offerings absorbed sufficiently to create from time to time an absence of any floating supply, which results in a mild bear hike to the timber. Contrary to the logic of things, wheat opened strong, cables were easy, and world weekly exports much more liberal than anticipated, which suggested that conditions under the market not being amenable to reason must be manipulative. On the whole, the action of market was strong and weak by turns.

In spite of apparent indifference to rains in the north of Argentina, which at present are detrimental to the harvest, the domestic market construed this as both. Moreover, late in the day a Duluth exporting house reported working a cargo of wheat to France, and while other messages from the seaboard were discouraging to foreign business, it is believed the export trade is larger than reported. Locally a keen cash demand prevailed. Millers were after the good spring wheat early and were active buyers. No. 1 Nor. sold from 2½ to 3½c. over December. Flour sales were fair, but selling competition is keen.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK

(Nov. 14)

Receipts were 113 loads with 3,610 head of cattle, 1,473 sheep and lambs and 43 calves. The improvement was more noticeable in heavy export cattle, for which at first there seemed to be no demand. Later there was a decided move to secure heavy cattle, several loads selling at \$6.25, or equal to the best price last week. The general average for export cattle today, however, would be nearer \$5.50, or a slightly lower average than last week.

Butcher choice to good were particularly steady at last week's prices.

Prices for good feeders show very little change, good quality selling at from \$3 to \$5.30 for steers and \$4 to \$4.45 for bulls.

Sheep, steady; lambs, steady, unchanged.

The hog market was weak; select, \$6.65, f. o. b., and \$7 fed and watered at Toronto market.
