KNOWLEDGE OF SELF

A Scientist's Observations of Cer tain ways of Children

They are Curious to Know all About Themselves as They Grow.

Dr. Sully remarks that children begin to acquire a knowledge of "self" when they are a few months old, and may be observed grasping, striking and biting their own hands or feet. A boy, whose feet were stained with new stockings, cried to his mother, "These ain't the feet I had this morning." The trunk is first recognized as part of self; then the head is regarded as the seat of intelligence. A child will "make believe" that it is more than one self and personify its members When only a few months old a baby does not know ita own face in a mirror until it finds out by experience. Children are often afraid of a shadow at first, but in time refer it to the sun. They attach every importance to their bodily appear ance, can scarcely believe that an earlier photograph of them as babies is really neant for them and feel almost new be ngs when dressed for church on Sunday. In time the conscious self which thinks, suffers and wills is dimly discerned. A girl of 3 years shut her eyes and believed her mother could see her body, but not her real self. One day she asked, "Mother, am I real, or only a pretend like my dolls?" The same child pitied the fallen leaves dying on the ground. A well known lady novelist when a child was amazed to think that she could feel and act by an internal self, and the consciousness of self came to George Sand one day as a sudden revelation. Children want to know how their

thoughts come to their tongue or limbs and imagine they travel down. Metamorphosis of self is a common idea among children, who fancy they have been something different at one time. They also find it hard to believe they never existed at all and will ask where they were a hundred years ago. A boy of 5 asserted that the world only began to go round when he was born. Another gravely said, when passing a street pump, "There are no pumps in heaven, where I came from." Children have a standard of time from adults, an hour seeming very long to them.

THE MULE'S DELUSION

When Well Trained he Becomes Proud of His Load.

Will Carry Anything From a Piano to a Bag of Oats.

The pack mule is quite as much as institution as the team mule and is absolutely indispensable in the mountains. Mule packing is a fine art, and with a well trained animal and a skillful packer you can safely transport anything from a piano to a bag of oats. Coreans Claim the Credit. According to a recent article Corea in one of our monthly magazines, that country lays claim have cast the first font of metal type the world had ever seen. The art of xylography had existed for centuries, and clay type had alone been used in Japan, but Corea was the first to discern the need of the now permanent and durable form of metal type. Each type was built on the principle of the arch, being cylindrically concave on the under side. The purpose of this was to secure a firmer hold upon the bed of beeswax which constituted the form.

A shallow tray was filled with wax, the type firmly embedded in it. The printer, sitting cross-legged before it, applied liquid ink by means of a soft brush, after which a sheet of paper was lightly laid upon the form. A piece of felt was brushed softly across the porous paper with the right hand, and the left removed the printed page. In this way it was possible to strike off 1,500 impressions in a day.

To Clean Tapentry. Tapestry and cretonne may be cleaned and revived by this process Cut up some soap into shreds, allowing four ounces of soap to each quart of water, and boil to a jelly. Have ready two tubs of pretty hot Have ready two tups of pretty not water. Add to this enough boiled soap to make a good lather. Add two handfuls of bran to prevent the color running. Wash quickly with little rubbing, first in one and then in the other tub, and then rinse out in either salt and water or vinegar the water or vinegar trid of and water. Shake well to get rid of the bran and dry at once. Starch in a thin boiled starch, roll tightly in clean cloth, mangle and then iron with a moderately hot iron. -- New York Press.


