My Dear Major—Yours of the 17th of January reached me at Cronje's Laager, on 5th of March but 1 had to wait-until I reached here to get the draft cashed. It cost 4 shilling 3 pence to get the cash so that left four shares of just 5 pounds 1 shilling each. Poor Donegan was, as you know knocked out in action so I held his share in knocked out in action so I held his share in the meantime pending further advice from you. I return your letter herein with the receipts of the other three men on the back. They were very thankful to get the money as they have had no pay since January and here they can find useful ways of spending it. We are likely to be here for some weeks and the rest will be very grateful to all ranks after a month's hard marching and fighting. With best regards, faithfully yours.
