Government Scandals Coming Home to Roost.

THE 'INEVITABLE CONSEQUENCES OF LONG HOLDING OF OFFICE' SHOW IN SUCH DISGRACEFUL AFFAIRS AS MURRAY'S CROWN LAND DEAL, AND OTHER WRONG-DOING BROUGHT TO LIGHT IN THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. House of Assembly, Halifax, April 15th.—One of the memorable remarks in political discussions of recent years was that of Premier Murray when he boldly observed that 'long holding of office has brought about the inevitable consequences—corruption and jobbery in every branch of the public service.' Mr. Murray was applying the words to other than his own party, but they reflect with intensity on his own administration, moribund as he is, and certain ere long to become defunct. During the present session of the provincial legislature some unsavory charges have been laid at the door of the men who occupy the benches to the speaker's right. The debates of the present session will make interesting reading for those who would defend a government such as that of which George Murray is the head.

THE PEOPLE WILL DEMAND SATISFACTION.

The crown land scandal in Inverness and Victoria and the tuberculosis scandal on the government farm at Truro, are two of the notable instances of wrong-doing brought home. These and other charges, of which most unsatisfactory explanations were given in the house, will come before the people and the government cannot hope to escape a reckoning day. Premier Murray's words are true in regard to his own government. 'Long holding of office brings the inevitable consequences of corruption and jobbery in the public service.' There is jobbery and corruption.

FOR FISHERMEN'S PROTECTION.

A move that may prove the basis of a province-wide protection to the 'men who go down to the sea in ships' has been inaugurated through the medium of a bill introduced in the house of Assembly by J. W. Margeson, the member for Lunenburg. It is the formation of a 'fisherman's benefit association' in that county. The bill comes as the result of a well-thought out plan on the part of the citizens of Lunenburg who, as Mr. Tanner observed, possess a happy faculty of carrying their ventures to a successful issue. Mr. Margeson explained the bill and Mr. Zwicker followed in hearty commendation of it. The yearly dues of the association are provided for as \$10 for each vessel, \$2 from each captain, and \$1 from each man. While the benefits only pertain to men engaged in banks fishing any man in the county may become a member. On death, the result of an accident or other influences incident to fishing on the banks, the beneficiaries of the deceased shall receive \$500. This will be regulated by the bye-laws yet to be framed.

RELATED OYSTER CULTIVATION.

It is strange that so often the Murray government only follows instead of leading. They do not lead in matters where they should be in advance. An illustration of this is furnished in the bill which proposes to develop barren areas along the shores and utilize them for oyster cultivation. The attorney-general frankly stated that the bill was patterned after measures to secure this end and which for some time had been law in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The government of those provinces saw the point long ago, which only now becomes visible to our antiquated administration.

METHOD OF OPERATION.

The oyster beds in the natural state are registered under the Dominion Fisheries act. Such a move as the one proposed does not in any way disturb that authority. It provides that oysters may be deposited and cultivated on barren bottoms. The idea is to lay out certain of these areas and lease them. Oysters will be deposited therein and will be owned by the lessee so long as he cares to hold the lease. The areas, the bill provides, will be about five acres each. Police officers are to be appointed to guard them and protect against the inroads of oyster thieves and take general care and oversight. Mr. Margeson sounded a note of warning against allowing foreigners to come in and obtain sweeping monopolies. Our people must be first.

Mr. Tanner thought the government should not stop here, but go on with a policy of education along general lines. This industry ought to be commended to the people of the province of Nova Scotia, and while he was not averse to seeing foreigners acquire reasonable leases under proper conditions, he urged that the industry be carried out at first in the interest of our own people.

The Shenandoah took 7,500 barrels of the winter varieties, thus rounding out the total export at somewhat above 700,000 barrels out of a crop that produced approximately 800,000 barrels.
