THE LESSON ANNAPOLIS TEACHES

The lesson of the recent Annapolis fire is an expensive one, but its cost may be justified if the lesson is duly heeded and properly learned. Any disaster similar to that which visited our sister town is bad enough, but when the result, as is shown, was in this case altogether unnecessary the situation becomes most regretful. It seems that the young boy, Tommy Miller, was generally recognised as a mental degenerate and a menace to the community. The case of Annapolis is not an unusual one. Those interested in the work of social uplift, and especially as it relates to the boy life of the country, recognize the fact that in nearly every section there are those growing up in an environment that will in all likelihood eventually make for community injury. Over and over again has the need been urged for better institutions for the training of the neglected young and the segregation of those who are, because of mental degeneracy, calculated to prove a common menace. In this county and in every other county in Nova Scotia there is needed a wide reform in this regard, and such reform, if brought about, would certainly tend to the economic welfare as well as the moral interests of all people.

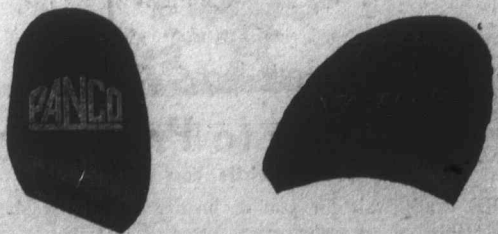
